The whole of the fishing grounds was covered with what is called young ice, that is ice frozen during the previous night, and too hard for the dories to row through to set their trawls. The drift ice kept only a few miles off shore for some time, and the last day shore boats were out, they got only a few small fish each. The drift ice has been over the fishing grounds and the fish have taken a sheer to the eastern banks, and many are of the opinion there will not be much more done until the middle of April. One of the schooners, the Catherine B. Rose, master, belonging to Hermitage, is the first to start for home, halling for 450 gtls. for 5 dories which is good, or better than any other schooner. 
