

Proceedings at the Synod

FRIDAY, June 30.
AFTERNOON SESSION.
The House met at 3.30 p.m., the Lord Bishop presiding, who read the opening prayers.

The Minutes of the previous Session were read and approved.

Pursuant to notice, Rev. Dr. Facey moved for the appointment of a Standing Committee to consider certain recommendations brought in by the Select Committee of the last Synod in relation to Finance, and to report to the next Session of the Synod. On being duly seconded, the House agreed.

The following Committee was appointed, viz.—Rev. Canon Smart, Rev. A. E. Tulk, B.A., R.D. (convenor), Rev. H. W. Facey, B.A., L. Th., Rev. A. B. Stirling, Rev. J. Brinton, Geo. House, Esq., A.A., F. C. Grant, Esq., R. G. MacDonald, Esq., C. E. Hunt, Esq., with power to add to their number.

Mr. I. J. Samson asked for the permission of the House to withdraw his notice for the appointment of the Committee of which he had given notice yesterday. The House gave permission.

His Lordship the Bishop appointed the following members to serve on the Diocesan Board of Missions, viz.—Rev. Canon Smart, Rev. E. C. Earp, H.A., Rev. W. R. J. Higgett, L. Th., with power to add to their numbers. Rev. Canon Smart presented the Report of the Diocesan Board of Missions, and moved for its adoption. On being seconded, the House agreed.

The Report stated among other things that from sources other than the Home and Foreign Mission Fund, the sum of \$11,085.00 had been raised during the Biennial period for Missionary purposes. The Board has continued to support the Rev. Ives Stocker, our own Missionary in China, whose visit last year, accompanied by his wife, evoked the utmost enthusiasm. Many of our people came under their influence, and were attracted by their personality. The outstanding feature of the visit was the memorable united offering service in the Cathedral of the Sunday School children of the Parishes in St. John's. The Bishop's Banner has been awarded this year to St. Mary's School, Heart's Content, whose offering amounted to \$404.00, a per capita offering of \$3.20.

The Board in conclusion asked for the adoption of the following resolutions, which they embodied in their report, viz:

1. "That immediate steps be taken to organize a Woman's Auxiliary Missionary organization for the Diocese, either by using the present Church of England Women's Association as a basis, or by forming a separate missionary organization along the lines of the Canadian Church Women's Auxiliary."
2. "That we endorse the resolution

passed at the last Synod for the appointment of a Field Secretary for the Diocese, and that this officer shall, if the Executive Committee so desire, be available for work in connection with carrying out the budget scheme."

Pursuant to notice Rev. Canon Bolt moved and it was duly seconded that the Rules of Order be suspended for the remainder of the Session. Agreed.

Pursuant to notice Rev. H. W. Facey moved the following Resolutions, which were duly seconded, in relation to appointment to livings, and in regard to the Budget System of Finance, viz:

1. "That it be a recommendation to the Executive Committee with regard to appointments during the next two years that in Parishes where the minimum salary cannot be maintained that the Bishop and the Executive do exercise the powers of the Constitution, viz:

1. "After investigation to alter the boundaries of Parishes to include two spheres of work, and be satisfied that the people are willing and able to raise the minimum salary before permission to elect a Parish Priest be given."
2. "That in other Parishes which fail to raise the minimum salary, a sympathetic investigation be carried out under the constitution to ascertain whether each Parish can raise the necessary funds to maintain its parochial status, and that if such an investigation finds that the minimum salary cannot be raised, that a Priest in charge be appointed under the Diocesan Mission Fund for the time being."

II. "That it be a recommendation to the Bishop that Canon Smart be appointed for one year to act in the capacity of Field Secretary, especially with a view to inducing our people to raise the necessary funds for the adequate support of the Church in the Diocese."

The resolutions were debated until the closing hour, when the debate was adjourned.

NIGHT SESSION.

The House resumed at 8 o'clock.

Sir W. H. Horwood asked that he be relieved from serving on the Standing Committee in respect to the Canadian Church Invitation. The request was acceded to.

Rev. A. E. Tulk also asked that he be relieved from serving on that Committee. Acceded to.

The House resumed the debate on the resolutions submitted by Rev. H. W. Facey, introduced in the afternoon session.

The debate continued until 10 o'clock, when on division the resolutions were adopted.

Pursuant to notice Dr. Blackall moved his resolution in regard to the work of the Lay Readers in this Diocese.

"That the Synod place on record its appreciation of the valuable services rendered to the Church by the Lay Readers, and wishes them happiness and blessing in their work."

"That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Lay Readers by the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod."

On being seconded the House unanimously agreed.

Dr. Blackall asked leave to withdraw his notice of question given yesterday. Leave was granted.

Rev. Canon Bayly also asked leave to withdraw his notice of question given yesterday. Leave was granted.

Rev. W. R. J. Higgett moved the following resolution which was duly seconded:—

"That the Executive Committee be asked to take some steps to submit a proposal to the next Synod with a view to simplifying procedure and to give the financial business of the Synod precedence on the Order Paper." The motion was unanimously adopted.

On motion, duly seconded, Messrs. J. J. Long and W. S. Monroe were elected as official auditors during the next two years.

His Lordship the Bishop gave his assent to amendments to the following Chapters, viz:—Chapter I, VII, XXIII, and XXIV, which have been passed during the Session.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the thanks of the Synod be tendered to his Excellency the Governor for the hospitable entertainment extended to the members of the Synod at the "At Home" at Government House on Saturday last.

Rev. C. Pittman moved and it was duly seconded and carried by acclamation that a very hearty vote of thanks be accorded to the Lord Bishop of the Diocese for the very able manner in which he has presided over this Session of the Synod.

Rev. C. Wood proposed and it was duly seconded that a hearty vote of thanks be tendered to the Ladies of St. John's for the very kind and hospitable manner in which the Clergy have been entertained while in the city, and to the Committee of Ladies who made the arrangements. Carried by acclamation.

Rev. H. Y. Whitehouse moved and it was seconded that the thanks of the Synod be accorded to the various women's and girls' organizations of the Church for their loyal and faithful work on her behalf. Carried by acclamation.

Rev. J. Hewitt moved and it was seconded that the thanks of the Synod be accorded to the Executive Committee of the Synod, for their unselfish and devoted labours. Carried by acclamation.

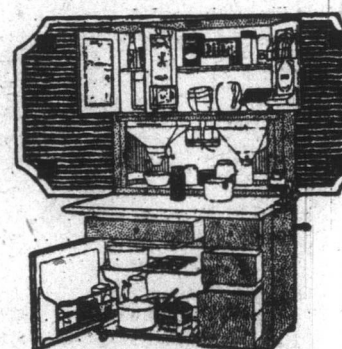
