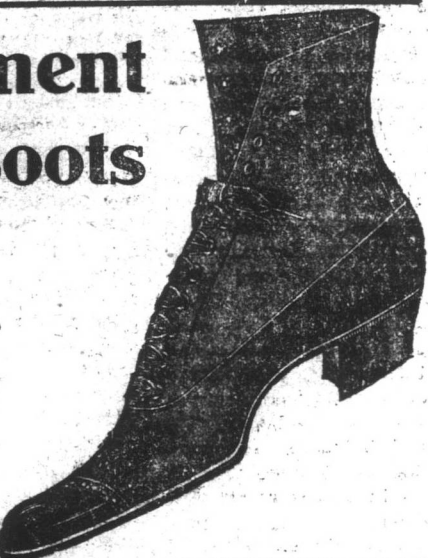

Old as the Flood.

OLD CLAIM PUT FORWARD
IN BEHALF OF OUR OLD-
EST INNS.

Question which is the oldest
house in England is a hard
one to settle, there being so many
claims to the distinction.

The King and Tinker, at Enfield, is
reputed to be over a thousand years
old, and has an inscription to that
effect above the door. It came by its
present unique title through King
James I. visiting it incognito while
out hunting in Enfield Chase, and

hobnobbing there with a tinker, who,
tradition says, he afterwards knight-
ed. The Fighting Cocks, St. Albans,
goes one better, and claims not only
to be the oldest inn, but likewise the
oldest inhabited house in England.
An inscription on its walls reads:
"Rebuilt after the Flood."

This, of course, is by way of a joke,
but the building is certainly of great
antiquity. Mr. F. W. Hackwood, a
famous authority, describes it as "a
curious structure of octagonal shape,
of early Saxon origin, having been
built as a bathhouse to the monastery
founded at St. Albans by King Offa
about 795."

Without Real Proof.
Another ancient inn, the George,
situated at Norton, St. Philip, a village
near Bath, claims it was licensed as
an almshouse in 1397. It was here that
the Duke of Monmouth slept on the
eve of the battle of Sedgemoor, and
the massive oaken door of the bed-
room he occupied, secured by an
immensely strong iron bolt, may still
be seen by visitors.

In the little lonely village of Hinton,
situated in the New Forest, about
three miles from Christchurch, is a
very ancient hostelry, the Cat and
Fiddle, commonly reputed to be about
eleven hundred years old. A Surrey
inn, Ye Old Six Bells, at Horley, is
said to have been built in 827. Ac-
cording to this, it would now be 1,095
years old.

The worst of it is that the claims of
so many of these old inns to be the
"oldest" rests upon tradition merely,
there being no documentary proof. If
we insist on this latter, as by rights
we ought to, then the Angel Inn,
Grantham, is the oldest hostelry.
We know from the Patent Rolls
that King John held a Court there on
February 28th, 1213, at which date it
was a house for the reception of trav-
ellers, whom it provided with food
and drink.

Putting the Blame on the Turk.

Who burned Smyrna? Some des-
patches, the earlier ones, said the
Turks did it. But did they? Assump-
tion plays a larger part in this process
than truth. It is a case of give a dog
a bad name. We are too much given
to immediately finding the Turk guilty
of any atrocity that is committed in
his section of the world. For a two
year period the Greeks had occupied
Smyrna. They were in process of

being expelled from that city and from
Asia. With the conquering Turk on
their heels the Greeks had nothing to
lose in the burning of the city, the
Turks everything. They would
have been burning what they were
about to possess. The Turk is at
least given the credit of having some
common sense, and in setting fire to
Smyrna he would be merely destroy-
ing his own property, or that which
would soon be his. At the time of the
Turkish military drive upon Smyrna
that city was filled with refugees, the
riff-raff of Asia, and as writer points

out all the elements of riot, disorder
and the destruction of property were
there, long before the Turkish army
was within gun shot.
It is also well to recollect that the
earlier despatches were through
Greek sources, and this would not
tend to give the Turk any the better
of the argument. From an independ-
ent source there comes some new
light on the situation that at least
partly exonerates the Turk. A des-
patch from Mark O. Prentiss, special
representative of the Near East Re-
lief in Smyrna, in making an appeal

to the United States for relief, says
in part:
"I hear, and firmly believe, many
stories of Greek atrocities and I have
abundant evidence that the Greek
army distributed enormous quantities
of ammunition among the civilians in
Smyrna and encouraged and or-
ganized sipping and bombing."
This sounds like a fair statement
from a man on the spot, and one who
would have no reason national or
otherwise, to hide the truth.—Sat-
urday Night, Toronto.
