pressure." He declared that where gases and fire exist they occupy pockets in the earth's crust, and that the center of the earth is not a molten mass.

Director Hayford's studies of isostacy have been translated and are now being used and referred to by scientists of every nation. Many geologists have accepted his theory. "Isostacy advances the supposition that rocks are lighter under the high parts of the American continent than the low parts," he said. "If the theory is true, then there is a hydrostatic pressure in the rocks of the earth everywhere at about 70 miles below sea level. Under the deeps of the Atlantic, rocks are four per cent. heavier than under Pike's Peak. Hence, the relation of the elevation above sea level on the one hand and the density of the rocks of that section of the globe down to a depth of about 70 miles on the other hand, is such that a column under any square mile of the earth down to 70 miles below sea level weighs nearly Director Hayford began work on Tsingtao Becomes the same as any other such column." his theory in 1900. 
