THE "ALBION" AND CANADIAN FINANCE.

THE KINGSTON MURDER. The trial of Ethan Allan commen

Kingston yesterday. The court wensely crowded. The father and moth of the prisoner Gemmell were present.— Hon. A. N. Richards and J. O'Rielly, Q. Hon. A. N. Richards and J. O'Rielly, Q.
