By an official notification from the Department of Inland Revenue traders and others are informed that the provisions of the present law relating to the weights of grain, seeds, roots, fruit, &c., will cease to have effect on and after the 1st day of January, 1874, and thereafter all these articles when bought or sold by weight shall be specified by the cental or parts of a cental—that is one hundred pounds. Those, therefore, who after that date make contracts based on bushels will only be bound by the bushel of capacity—and not of weight. This important change may be attended with some inconvenience for a short time; but will on full trial prove as satisfactory as did the exchange of £. s. d. currency for the decimal.—Monetary Times.
