The various actors in the Pacific—farce, we were about to say, were it not too serious a matter—are bringing forward explanatory statements one after the other.

With the inception of these charges I had, neither directly nor indirectly, anything to do. I never communicated to Mr. Huntington or any other member of the Opposition, or, so far as I know, any one acting for them, any information on which they could have been founded.

I—nor no one for me—ever received, directly or indirectly, from Mr. Huntington or any one interested in the prosecution of this case, any money or valuable consideration, or promise of either, for Pacific Railway information or for anything else.

THE PACIFIC SCANDAL.—Following upon preceding remarks heron the N. Y. Tribune says, referring to Sir Hugh's affidavit: "We cannot tell how much a confession strikes the Canadian mind; in this country where we have had much sad experience with men who corrupt elections, it would be taken as an acknowledgment of the whole case."

It is stated at Ottawa that the Government has decided to advise the Governor General to prorogue Parliament immediately on reassembling in August.

Messrs. Langevin and Mitchell have left Ottawa, the former for Quebec and the latter for Nova Scotia.

East Ward Election.

The nomination meeting was held in the town hall at noon to-day. About forty persons were present, and Mr. Geo. M. Todd, Returning Officer, presided.

The Returning Officer opened the proceedings by reading the official notice of the meeting, and then announced himself ready to receive nominations.

Mr. John Horsman proposed Mr. Chas. Davidson in a brief speech. Mr. Wm. Allan seconded Mr. Davidson.

Mr. Robert Melvin briefly proposed Mr. David McCrae. Mr. J. P. MacMillan seconded this nomination.

It was then suggested that the candidates should address the meeting at one o'clock. Mr. Davidson was called on, but declined to speak unless he was sure that no one else was to be nominated.

Mr. McCrae then addressed the electors, and Mr. Davidson followed. At five minutes to one the Returning Officer asked if there were any more nominations, whereupon:

Mr. Melvin proposed, and Mr. Hogg seconded the nomination of Mr. Massie. Mr. C. Sharpe proposed, and Mr. Chadwick seconded the nomination of Mr. Fahy.

Mr. Davidson continued his speech, and some wrangling ensued between him and Mr. Hogg.

A poll was demanded on behalf of each candidate, and a vote of thanks to the returning officer concluded the proceedings.

The meeting being prolonged nearly to the time of our going to press, we are unable to give a more lengthened report to-day.

THE FISHERY ACT.—Proceedings have been instituted against the Ontario Fish Factory, Hamilton, for violation of the fishery laws, by allowing deleterious matter to run into the Bay to the injury of fish. Messrs. Parsons Bros., Carbon Oil Works, were also proceeded against, a few days ago. The Spectator says, that the great advantage of the law for the protection of fish is manifested daily in Hamilton fish market by the large quantity exposed for sale.
