Delegates from nearly 50 associations in Wentworth attended the county convention in Arcade Hall, Hamilton, on Tuesday morning, the chair being occupied by County President Alex. Ironsides, and County Secretary T. S. Henderson doing duty as recorder. During the session lengthy discussions took place on several questions, chief among which were the toll gate nuisance, the market fee grievance and the selt and binder twine questions.

The Executive Committee was instructed to wait on the city authorities and confer with them about a free market in Hamilton, and the following resolution was unanimously passed re binder twine. Moved by Major Walker and seconded by Alex. Ironsides:

"That this meeting of Patrons is of the opinion that it will be in the interests of the farmers of this Province for them to do without binder twine during the coming season unless some arrangement can be arrived at whereby the Grand Executive Board can procure binder twine at a reasonable price without being ground down, as the Patrons are at present, by the monopolists in binder twine, who are trying to you goes an unjust price from the farmers for their twine."


