FAIR AND COLD TODAY AND TOMORROW.
 Toronto, Dec. 23—11 p.m.—The low area which was over Alberta and Saskatchewan yesterday still hovers there, whilst the depression then central over the Georgian Bay is now over the northern portion of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Higher pressure and colder weather is nearing the lakes from the Northwest. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Esquimaux, 33-40; Calgary, 23-34; Qu'Appelle, 6-14; Winnipeg, 23 below zero; Port Arthur, 18 below zero; Toronto, 16-22; Ottawa, 10-15; Montreal, 10-14; Quebec, 6-14; Halifax, 14-20.
 Probabilities: Toronto, Dec. 24—1 a.m. Lower lakes: Fair and decidedly cold, with westerly and northerly winds and local snow flurries on Friday; continued fair and cold on Saturday, with somewhat higher temperature at night. Local temperatures: The highest and lowest reading of the thermometer at the observatory here yesterday were: 25 and 8 above.

A PIGEON-TOED TURKEY
 Causes Trouble at Komoka—An Arrest and an Acquittal.
 An ordinary pigeon-toed turkey has been causing a great deal of commotion in the vicinity of Komoka. The other night Mr. John Harrison was robbed of ten turkeys, including the pigeon-toed bird alluded to. Shortly afterwards he learned that a gobbler of the pigeon-toed variety had been seen in the barnyard of Mr. John A. McKellar, a prominent and respected contractor and poultry dealer. A search warrant was at once secured, and sure enough a pigeon-toed bird was found at Mr. McKellar's. The latter was apprehended on a charge of theft, which caused a great sensation in the district. The case came before Squire Edwards on Tuesday last. Mr. R. H. Dignan, London, represented the defendant, and Mr. J. B. McKillop the crown. Mr. Harrison and some of his witnesses testified that the turkey in question was the identical one which had been stolen. Mr. McKellar resolutely denied this. He said that he had just purchased some fowl from Mr. John McKinley, and the pigeon-toed one was among this lot.
 Mr. McKinley was called, and swore that he had raised a pigeon-toed turkey, that on the Monday of the arrest he had sold Mr. McKellar some turkeys, and the pigeon-toed bird was among them.
 Mr. McKellar was honorably acquitted.

TALBOT STREET BAPTISTS
 Hold a Successful Christmas Sunday School Entertainment—Excellent Programme—The Secretary's Report.
 A large and merry crowd of scholars, teachers and their friends attended the Christmas entertainment of the Talbot Street Baptist Sunday school last night, despite the storm, and the programme, given principally by the children, was very meritorious. The school singing was especially good, and elicited from the pastor, Rev. Ira Smith, who presided, the expression of opinion that it was the best given since he had taken charge of the church.
 Secretary J. W. Westervelt, jun., read the annual report of the school, showing 220 scholars on the roll, 120 of whom were in the intermediate school, 60 in the infant class, 15 in the Bible class and 25 teachers. The average attendance was 163—pupils, 142, and teachers, 21—and the largest attendance of any Sunday was 208, on Jan. 1, 1910, being scholars and 22 teachers. The total receipts were \$166 77, including a thank offering of \$20 97, and the average collection was \$2 27. Of the receipts \$11 went to foreign and \$14 15 to home missions.
 The programme was opened with a few remarks from Rev. Ira Smith, and an address of welcome from Stuart Hudson. Several choruses were given by the school and the infant class, and the report of the library was read by Miss E. Ellis.
