Had any one of the men on the beach gone to Mr. Travers' assistance, or had they not completely lost their heads, Mr. Woolcott could have been easily rescued. To those on the hill it did not appear possible that the man could drown. He went down in four feet of water. Miss Wood, the young lady to whom he was engaged, and his sisters, who were on the beach at the time, were witnesses of the young man's fearful struggle for life, and their terrible distress was painful to behold.
