What Borneans Here Believe Under the Rule of an Englishman.

Fresh Accounts of the Race From Which the Museum's "Wild Men" Were Wont to Come - How They Dress, Court, Marry and Do Other Things.

An anthropological study in a thousand pages is an achievement which German thoroughness might envy, and there can be no question that in "The Natives of Sarawak and British North Borneo," Mr. Henry Ling Roth has produced a work of solid value. The modern history of Sarawak is in itself a romance, the country being one of the now necessarily very rare instances of a kingdom carved out by the energy, determination and genius for rule of one man. In this respect it is certainly the most interesting corner of the Malay Archipelago. Before the arrival on the scene of the young Englishman who afterward became Rajah Brooke, the Dyaks were the prey of all the pirates, slave raiders and freebooters who, until very recent times, infested Malayan wa-

No sooner had young Mr. Brooke converted himself into an absolute monarch by obtaining the cession of that northwestern portion of the Island of Borneo which we know as Sarawak, than the harassed natives began to breathe more freely. The pirates were kept at a respectful distance, life and property became secure, and, with a gratitude that might been found among a more sophisticated people, the rajah was revered as a superior being, descended to earth to succor the afflicted. Primitive man, as he is still to be seen in Borneo, seems, however, to have a good many ideas and customs not very far removed from those of more polished peoples. He knows all about déluge, possesses an improved version of purgatory, and has a firm

belief in guardian angels. Like his white fellow-subjects of the west, he may not marry his deceased wife's sister or his grandmother, and, although divorce is easy, public opinion does not consider it respectable to break the seventh commandment. The young Dyak gallant is quite as particular about the sit and fashion of his voluminous waist cloth as any European dandy about the fit of his necktie, while his sister lavishes the paternal wealth upon the brass wire corsets, which are her proudest gar-

ment.

Even in his sports the methods of the Dyak are not altogether unfamiliar. He fishes with a float, knows how to bait a hook scientifically, and angles for crocodiles with a dead monkey for bait-the "higher" the monkey the bigger the bag. In the art of poling. which is now becoming so favorite a branch of aquatics, he could give points to the most expert practitioner on the Thames. On the whole, he seems to live a happy life, tempered by a few lingering regrets that, at all events in Sarawak, he is no longer permitted to take occasional holidays in search of heads. That grim sport, so far as it still exists, appears to be almost entirely kept in fashion by the ladies. These Malayan daughters of Herodias turn disdainfully from a wooer who has never shortened a man by a head. No head, no wife, is their rule ,though, to do them justice, it must be admitted that they are not too exigent as to whose it is or how obtained. A woman's will serve, and, singularly enough, he who obtains this essential in what seems, to our western notions, the less sportsmanlike fashion, is esteemed a remarkably clever fellow.
