THE ARMISTICE.
Dispatches received in the House of Commons confirm the reports that an armistice of a week had been arranged between the Mussulmans and Christians at Selino, in the island of Crete, and the Russian islands, Mr. Curzon advised that the consul had done his best to calm the Christians, intimating that the solution of the Cretan question depended upon the great powers. This, it appears, made a great impression, but the dispatches of the consul further stated, would not suffice to save the 2000 Mussulmans at Candamos from certain death if a Greek war vessel appears there. From an interview with the consul, it is gathered that the Christian outbreak at Selino was due entirely to the belief that the Mussulmans had been massacred at Candamos, and to the encouragement received from the presence of the Greek war vessel. Mr. Curzon, commanding the Greek forces in Crete, and the Greek forces, have, owing to the presence of the war vessel, abandoned their idea of attacking the town, and the Greek forces will be made at various points.

THE CONFLAGRATION AT CANEA.
London, Feb. 25.—A Canea dispatch while the Governor's palace was burning a strong box containing 47,000 fell into the flames and broke, whereupon the Turkish soldiers and Mussulmans to secure the treasure. The foreign legation were obliged to throw away their cartridges to restrain them and for a time serious conflict between the Turks and Europeans was threatened. The Italian squadron, who is in command of the Italian naval forces in Crete, was guarded by a strong force of Italian sailors. The energetic efforts of the foreign forces occupying the town, which were continued for three hours, alone saved the thickly populated island of Crete from destruction. Detachments of sailors from the warships in the harbor were landed to assist in the work of fighting the flames. The fire destroyed the last vestige of material.

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Salisbury's Course Regarding the Cretan Situation
Arouses a Storm of Opposition in England.

Said to be Doing the Bidding of Emperor William.
The Reports of a Week's Armistice at Canea Confirmed.

Details of the Incendiary Conflagration—Valuable Records Destroyed—Creta Considered to Have Cut Loose From Turkey.

London, Feb. 25.—Discontent is rapidly growing among the masses in respect to the policy of the Government towards Creta. The Liberals are furious. The Daily Chronicle strongly urges the masses to agitate against the Government, and Jerome K. Jerrold's paper says that the Marquis of Salisbury is no Englishman, that he is "doing the bidding of that pompous brute, Emperor William." The Conservative papers of England, and indigues in other language towards them which is almost unprintable. The concluding remarks are: "If the concert of Europe is broken up, it will have been done by the devil's work, in the name of God let it go down and be drowned in its own blood. Better war from the Rhine to the Urals than that this infamy should continue. There has been a concert of nothing but the shrieks of the dying and tortured."

waiting for that. The principle of arbitration seems to be strongly supported in America, and there is every reason why it should appeal to Europe. Even the watch of the course of America as friends. I desire you to say to the American people from me personally that nothing would please me more than to hear of their success." President Faure's statement describes the situation exactly as it is. M. Patenotre, the French ambassador at Washington, has the draft of the Franco-American arbitration treaty in the desk in his office. The ambassador of France is very much disgruntled over the failure of the Senate to ratify the Coney-Faure convention. He had hoped that an arbitration treaty would be passed by the Senate. He is now waiting for the French government to take action.

The Senate is in favor of an arbitration treaty with France, while many Senators have the Anglo-American symposium well defined that they will never consent to ratify any agreement which might be construed as advantageous to England.

The Patenotre treaty will not be signed by Secretary Olney. He has, in fact, refused to attach his signature to the convention, declaring that it will be useless at the present time, on the ground that the French government has not yet taken any action.
