CAUGHT BY THE CAMERA.

Holders of Passes to the World's Fair Must be Photographed.

CHICAGO, April 5.—During the fair holders of passes are to have vignettes of their faces in one corner of their precious pasteboards. This is done in order that a man with a full beard may not gain admission to the grounds on a vignette which shows a close-shaven face. All concessionaires are to have passes. This is also true of royal commissioners from foreign countries and of all the rest of the people who are entitled to free admission and profound courtesy at the gates.

The big men from Spain, Germany and France have already protested against this proceeding, claiming that to have their faces photographed upon their passes is not only a gratuitous attack upon their integrity, but an unpardonable insult to the countries which they represent. But the order has gone forth, and whatever complications may arise of an international nature are certain to fall directly upon the shoulders of the World's Fair officials.

All day yesterday the north wing of the horticultural hall was packed with men who were ready to have their faces photographed for identification on their passes. They began coming as early as 9 o'clock, and two hours later the stairway leading up to the photographer's room was so jammed with men that the guard, fearing that that portion of the gallery would give way beneath such a great weight, ordered half of the long line to retire to the main floor. Those who did not have recent pictures of themselves were photographed with heads will have to wear their check and chin adornments to the end of the fair or stand again before the camera of the picture taker.

THE HONDURAS REVOLT.

Complete Success of the Insurgents—Gen. Bonilla Proclaimed President.

PANAMA, April 5.—News of the signal defeat of the Government troops near Tegucigalpa, Honduras, was received in this city Sunday night by mail. The report was confirmed in advices brought later by the officers of the steamer Barracota, who added the information that the revolutionists had finally triumphed, and that Policarpo Bonilla had been proclaimed President of the Republic.

CHICAGO, April 5.—The latest computation of Carter Harrison's plurality for mayor, over Allerton, the citizens' and Republican candidate, is 18,471. The new City Council is Republican.

Tax on Aliens.

HARRISBURG, Pa., April 5.—In the House to-day the bill requiring unnaturalized males of 21 years of age or over to pay an annual tax of \$3, was passed finally. The bill prohibiting the employment of any but American citizens upon work to which State funds are appropriated, was defeated.

Sir John Abbott's Health.

MONTREAL, April 5.—Sir John Abbott arrived from New York this morning. He could not be seen, as his daughter said he had strict orders from the doctor to avoid all excitement and to do no business. When asked about Sir John's health, Miss Abbott replied: "He is moderately well."

THE KEMPTVILLE TRAGEDY.

Death in Both Cases Resulted From Arsenical Poisoning.

KEMPTVILLE, Ont., April 5.—The inquest relating to the deaths of Mrs. John Kennedy and her brother-in-law, Alexander Kennedy, which occurred on March 4 last under circumstances which gave rise to the suspicion of poisoning, came to an end at 12:35 o'clock this afternoon, when the coroner's jury returned a verdict to the effect that death in both cases had resulted from arsenical poison administered by some person or persons unknown to it.

Honolulu Preferences.

VICTORIA, April 5.—H. M. S. Garnet arrived yesterday from Honolulu. The officers and English residents of the islands, next to being taken over by England, prefer being annexed by the United States. The natives, however, prefer a monarchical government. It is thought the planters will oppose annexation.

Insurance Rates Raised.

MONTREAL, April 5.—The insurance underwriters met to-day and advanced rates about 30 per cent. upon retail dry-goods stocks and 25 per cent. upon printing and lithographing stocks. The advance applies to Montreal only. Retail dry-goods merchants are also to be compelled to insure up to 75 per cent. of the value of their stock. A couple of United States companies have lately been cutting down these lines in Montreal.
