On account of this, and in recognition of the efforts put forth by Sir John on behalf of the colony, it is probable the settlement will be named Llewellyn after him. Mr Griffith has received reports showing that the old settlement in Patagonia, where 2,000 Welsh colonists are still living, has been again visited by disastrous floods. The people, he said, had been compel-led to flee to the hills to save their lives. He believed that this fact would induce many of these settlers to follow the example of the men who had come to Canada. There was also a probability that many Welshmen now residing in the United States would cross the border to join their country. men. These men were all thoroughly acquainted with farming conditions, and it was anticipated that the colony near Saltcoats would become one of the most flourishing districts in the Northwest Territories.




