AbdulHamid Wants to Placate Uncle Sam.

GOVERNMENT WAS TOO SLOW

French Authorities Delayed Enforcement of School Decrees Too Long—Sir Wilfrid's Plans.

Constantinople, Aug. 21.—Through the medium of Izet Bey, one of his secretaries, the sultan sent a friendly message to the United States Minister, John G. A. Leishman, today, assuring him that the pending claims of the United States would be complied with and begging the minister to resume his visits to the porte.

In consequence of these fresh assurances, Mr. Leishman visited the sultan's residence, the Dolma Bagiche, today, and Mr. Leishman and Robert S. McCormick, the American ambassador to Austria-Hungary, were ambassadors to the sultan tomorrow and will probably have an audience of the sultan.

ROME AND THE PINOS.
Home, Aug. 22.—The Vatican authorities have completed the collection of documents relating to the Philipines question, for the use of the apostolic delegate at Manila, and it is conjectured that his appointment is imminent. The complete history of the negotiations on the subject of the Philipines is given, including a summary of the voluminous report of Manager Chapelle, the former papal delegate in the Philipines, and the full text of the notes exchanged between Governor Taft and the Vatican. These are supplemented by precise instructions regarding which secrecy is maintained, though Cardinal Rampolla, the papal secretary of state, expresses the hope that the instructions are so framed as to enable the delegate to fill the pope's promise to Governor Taft, namely, to reach a solution satisfactory to both parties.

TOO SLOW.
Paris, Aug. 22.—The correspondent of the Associated Press was informed at the French official today that the success of Jules Cambon as French ambassador to Washington, had not yet been appointed, but that M. Jusserand, French minister of foreign affairs, had been selected for the post.

The French Government, says the Paris correspondent of the London Times, is determined to leave nothing to the last enforcement of the decrees against the congregationalist schools in Brittany, thus giving time for the agitators to grow. The Bretons of Brittany resemble the Puritans. Unlike other Bretons, whose fathers were a delight to artists, they are averse to the arts and music. They know nothing about politics; their deputy, Abbe Gayraud, is a Republican, but he is not a seat as a Republican.

The abbe's eloquence excited the people to the verge of insurrection, and he had the utmost difficulty in persuading the crowd at St. Meen to cease resisting the troops.

BRAVERLY RECOGNIZED.
The Liverpool marine board, on behalf of the government, has awarded the British steamer Roddam, with a silver vase in recognition of his devotion to duty in getting his vessel away from St. Pierre, Martin, when the town was destroyed by the eruption of Mont Pelee. Captain Freeman has previously received three medals for his gallant conduct at St. Pierre.

SIR WILFRID'S MOVEMENTS.
Le Temps, of Paris, says Sir Wilfrid Laurier and M. Delcasse, minister of foreign affairs, will together examine several conventions which might be concluded between Canada and the United States. Sir Wilfrid is expected to leave for the St. Stephen's seminary in honor of the St. Stephen's fathers, the first colonizers of Canada. On Wednesday he will leave for the Hotel de Ville, at Lille, and on Aug. 30, he will be a guest at a banquet to be given at the Palace Pousay, Hotel Paris.

RIOTS IN CHINA.
There has been anti-Christian rioting at Shen-Chan, Honan Province, says a Shanghai correspondent of the London Times, and there is an uncomfortable feeling that Messrs. Lewis and Bruce, missionaries, have been murdered.

CABLE NOTES.
The accomplishment of the Empress of Russia is expected shortly.

The London Times' Canadian correspondent says that Dr. Jameson arrived there on Tuesday.

A special cable from Wellington, New Zealand, to the London Times says: "Representatives of the press have been excluded from the inquiry into the alleged overcrowding of the troopship Britannic."

SIXTEEN DEAD

Final Roster of Victims of the Pulp Mill Disaster at Wilmington.

Wilmington, Del., Aug. 21.—Five bodies were found in the ruins of the Jessup and Moore Paper Company's digesting room today and tonight, bringing the number of known dead up to sixteen.

The bodies found were those of Wm. R. Mousley, Bernard Sweeney, Wm. Scott and John Henry. Joel Hutton, a fireman, is the only employee whose body has not yet been recovered. The injured in the hospital will recover.

LITTLE BOY DROWNED.
Toronto, Aug. 21.—George Bell Hope, the four-year-old son of Mr. Hope, 45 King street west, a Shelden Company firm, was drowned today in the Provincial Winter Park building. One hundred animals were offered. The lot was cleared out quite early in the afternoon at a high average of \$39. The sale netted \$3,345, and the expense of selling averaged \$5 per head.

A registered sow, bred by J. E. Brethour, brought \$225, which is considered the highest price ever paid for one animal on the continent. Another sow, bred by Brethour and Saunders, of Burford, was sold at \$185.

CAPE COLONY HAS NEW LEADER

The Progressives Marshaled Under Dr. Smart.

PREMIER SPRIGG REPUDIATED

Latter May Form a Colonial Commission—Belgium Does Not Want the Boer Generals.

London, Aug. 22.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Cape Town says: The progressive party has elected Dr. J. W. Smart to be their leader, repudiating Sir J. Gordon Sprigg, the premier.

This probably means that the suspensionist wing of the progressive party has chosen Dr. Smart, who was commissioner of public works when he resigned owing to the agitation for the suspension of the colony's constitution as its leader.

The first meeting of the Progressives, says a Cape Town correspondent, has been held to decide the party's course of action in the Parliament. Sir Gordon Sprigg has neither consulted the party nor explained the course of action he has taken in the event of the majority. The party is forced to demand a hearing for its legitimate demands for legislation in the interests of the colony and the empire.

The correspondent says that a moderate tone prevails in the party councils. While supporting the ministry regarding its attitude for the acts committed under martial law, and regarding unauthorized expenditure, the party will demand bills dealing with sedition, and regulating the importation of arms and ammunition. The Progressives, however, are inadequately organized.

SPRIGG'S PLANS.
Sprigg, supported by the Afrikaner Bond, will, it is believed, probably form a colonial commission, with full powers to make restitution for losses, material and otherwise, under martial law. The correspondent says that with such a commission, working in an unrestrained manner, the views of the suspensionists are likely to be realized.

It is announced here in a special dispatch from Brussels that the Belgian Government has requested the Boer generals, Botha, De Wet, and Delany, to enter Belgium, and that the stationmaster at the Northern railroad station has been instructed to summon troops to keep order in the event of the receiving notification of the presence of the generals on board a train from Holland.

HALIFAX FAVORED.
Sydney, N. S., Aug. 21.—This morning's session of the Maritime Board of Trade was almost exclusively devoted to the discussion of a resolution introduced by Capt. Allen, of Kentville, in connection with the fast Atlantic route. The resolution was seconded by S. G. Campbell, of Halifax, and it was finally passed unanimously. The consensus of opinion in the matter was strongly in favor of the service being equal in speed to any across the Atlantic, with Halifax as the terminal the year round.

W.S. CALVERT, M.P., RETURNS

Chief Liberal Whip Arrives at Capital From Europe.

With Other Members He Toured Continent and Saw Coronation.
