## JEWES ARE PREPARING

They Arm Themselves and Organize for Fresh Riots.

Berlin, June 4.—Advices received here from Odessa say the Jews have imported several thousand revolvers since the Kishineff massacre, so that at present almost every Jew, man or woman, is armed. Those who were unable to buy revolvers received them as gifts from the defense committee. A system of communication has also been agreed upon, so as to spread a warning throughout the city if there is an outbreak in any quarter. Families residing near each other will concentrate for defense, and every second man will join what might be called an expeditionary corps to take part in aggressive defense where rioting is actually going on. The Jewish Safety Committee is also reported to have arranged with the workmen's associations for aid in the event of outbreaks. Arms have been distributed from Odessa to the Jews in other cities of Russia.

## Copper in Nova Scotia.

Halifax, N. S., June 4.—A rush for mining areas has occurred at the mines office here as a result of a big strike of copper ore reported from Cheticamp, Cape Breton. An immense seam of copper ore over 100 feet wide is said to have been found a few miles from Cheticamp village. The miners' department consider the matter of sufficient importance to secure a special report by an engineer.

## HOUSE DIVIDES ON AMENDMENT

Playfair Assessment Arouses a Discussion.

## SPEED OF MOTORS ESTABLISHED

The Legislature Sets It at Ten Miles an Hour—Exporting Natural Gas.

Toronto, June 3.—The Ontario Legislature today fixed the speed of automobiles in cities, towns and incorporated villages at ten miles an hour. The municipal committee had amended Mr. Preston's bill so as to limit the speed to seven miles. Mr. Preston moved the House into committee of the whole, and asked that the original clause be inserted.

Dr. Willoughby favored seven miles; that would, to a great extent, prevent accidents to pedestrians. The Attorney-General said he had ridden in automobiles and thought ten miles was not an excessive speed. The machines were easily handled, and could be stopped within a few yards.

Woodstock, June 4.—At Knox Church yesterday morning at 8:30 o'clock, by Rev. Dr. McMillan, was solemnized the marriage of Miss Margaret, second daughter of Mr. David Shedd, Van Sturt, to Mr. William Campbell Bowler, assistant general freight agent of the western division of the C. P. R., with headquarters at Calgary. Mr. and Mrs. Bowler left on a trip down the St. Lawrence before proceeding to their future home at Calgary.

## Sully's Generous Tip.

Providence, R. I., June 4.—Daniel J. Sully, who has just closed a successful bull campaign on the New York Cattle Exchange, sailed for Europe on the Oceanic from New York for a two months' rest, combined with a little business. Before leaving for New York he distributed \$20,000 among his associates and clerks, the office of the F. W. Reynolds Company on South Water street, of which he is the head.

Practice of 20 Years Standing Found To Be Illegal.

## PROGRESS ON RAILROAD BILL

Out of 310 Clauses 120 Have Been Considered—Senate Discusses the Chinese Immigration Bill.

Ottawa, June 3.—Mr. Sutherland today introduced a bill to amend the public works act. He explained that for the past twenty years or thereabouts it had been the practice to let without tenders any public works of less value than \$5,000. This practice the supreme court has lately pronounced illegal. The object of the bill is to secure the authority of Parliament for this method of doing business.

Mr. Ingram was informed that the Government had no power to institute prosecutions for violation of the alien act. There has been eight applications to the Government to prosecute, but no subsequent proceedings other than a prosecution for perjury. The suggestion of the Toronto Board of Trade that any documents employed by railway companies and by employees against the company should be received without further proof of the genuineness of the signatures, was accepted.

The bill to incorporate the Erie-Ontario Power Company, the bill respecting the Canadian Northwestern Irrigation Company, the United Empire Life Insurance bill, and the Atlantic, Quebec and Western Railway bill, were each read a third time and passed.

The evening was spent in committee on Mr. Blair's railway commission bill, and when the committee rose 120 out of the 310 clauses had been considered.

The Senate this afternoon discussed the Government's Chinese immigration bill, of which Senator Templeman moved the second reading. He made a lengthy speech in favor of the bill, pointing very largely from the report of the Ontario immigration commission of two years ago. He pointed out that the measure was not of a party description, and urged that it should be passed in deference to public opinion in the west.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell moved the adjournment of the debate.
