St. Petersburg, Nov. 5, 1:41 p.m. Russia has acomplished the telegraphic draft of the Anglo-Russian convention of inquiry into the North Sea incident, submitted to Russia on Wednesday, as announced in these dispatches at the time, and the final exchanges will be ratified in London. The convention covers slx articles, as previously forecasted from here. The ommission will sit in Paris, and will consist of five members, Russian, British, American and French, Broad outlines for the inquiry are laid down by the convention, but the commission will have wide latitude in determining all the relevant facts. Although the vention is agreed to; it is believed that some minor matters connected with the subject, the exact nature of which cannot be ascertained, are still unde-
