

CETEWAYO'S SON WITH COLONIALS

Many Big Zulu Chiefs Fighting
With British Against
Rebels.

Durban, May 14.—Further details of the murder of Magistrate Stainbank, while collecting taxes, are to hand. He was magistrate of Mahlabitini, Zululand.

Mr. Stainbank was accompanied by Mrs. Stainbank, another lady, and the policeman, Fellars. The party was returning from tax collecting, in which no difficulty had been experienced.

About 7 o'clock on May 3, the party had reached the southern bank of the White Umfolozi River, when, without warning, a body of natives fired a volley. Mr. Stainbank and Fellars were both hit.

The party fled to Mahlabitini, ten miles distant, where they were molested. Mr. Stainbank died on his arrival at the magistracy.

It is impossible at present to estimate the significance of the outrage. It appears to be a case of cold-blooded murder rather than an act of organized rebellion, although it is certainly sympathetic of the growing native lawlessness.

The Government has received further reports concerning the affair, which are at present kept secret. It is, however, stated that they throw little light upon the matter.

A few days will show whether the murder is of a political character, but the fact that Mr. Stainbank had successfully collected the taxes when he and his party were attacked would point in the opposite direction.

Sitshishi, one of the most powerful chiefs in the district, is assisting in the operations, and is proud of the fact that no single rebel belongs to his tribe.

The local chief of the Mahlabitini district is behaving well, and has turned out his night, in search of the murderers, of which at present there is no trace. Apparently there is no general disaffection among the Mahlabitini natives.

All the surrounding chiefs arrived expressed indignation and grief at the murder of Mr. Stainbank. They declare their determination to trace the murderers.

Dinzuza, Cetewayo's son, has also sent his chief, induna, Mankuluma, to the magistracy at Nongoma, with similar expressions of regret. He begs to be allowed to send Mankuluma with 20 picked men to search for the criminals.

Mr. Saunders, native commissioner, has accepted Dinzuza's offer, and has instructed Mankuluma to begin the search forthwith.

BANDIT LEADER IS ROUNDED UP

Police Believe Have Head of
Gang That Held Up the
Imperial Limited.

Vancouver, B. C., May 14.—That in James Christie, arrested at Vernon on Saturday, the police have the leader of the bandits who held up the Imperial Limited, is the belief of the Canadian Pacific authorities.

Christie was caught in the mountains at Ouellet Trail, leading from Campbell Meadows, which the robbers entered from the Kamloops side.

James Mole and W. Wilson, also arrested at Vernon, are not thought to have taken part in the robbery, but are believed to be confederates of the desperado.

A detachment of mounted police from Calgary, under the command of Commissioner J. E. Macdonald, arrived at Campbell Creek immediately on arrival, and Christie's two lieutenants are likely to be caught any moment.

A special from Kamloops says the pursuers of the train robbers think they have the bandits located in a big hill along a high mountain, covered with scrub timber lying to the south of Campbell Meadows.

Back of the big hill the country is rough and heavily timbered, and will be hard for the robbers to get through. Articles of clothing and camp utensils belonging to the thieves have been found, and the pursuers are now resting, awaiting the arrival of Constable Young with the Oregon bloodhounds which have been very successful in tracking outlaws in that state.

The police don't want to disturb the track and spoil the scent, so they are going easy till the bloodhounds get on the scent.

The princess has quite as serious a case of love-sickness. When Alfonso was coming off the yacht at Gairdala to greet Ena, they both rushed at each other simultaneously before the gangway was secured, and but for restraining hands they probably would have embraced in the sea.

Each night Alfonso had to literally be ordered home by the Princess Henry of Battenburg, and he was always around again next morning before the royal household was well astir.

The lovers were entirely unconscious of the nudging and snickering that went on among the royal suite at their frantic boy and girl love antics, and only laughed when Ena's young brothers mimicked in pantomime their perfunctory meetings and tearful partings.

At dinner Alfonso sat aside all etiquette and insisted on sitting beside Ena, and they embraced the company by holding each other's hands under the table, entirely oblivious that they were not alone.

In view of this condition of affairs, the scene, when the party came for three weeks, was anticipated with profound anxiety. The king and princess motored together in a closed tonneau from Kensington to Southampton, and when the car arrived at its destination where Princess Henry and the king's suite were awaiting them, the blinds were tightly drawn.

The car stopped, the company waited, but the royal lovers made no move to get out. For ten minutes this situation lasted. Ena's mother trying to preserve a graceful silence, as broader and broader smiles overpread the countenances of all around her. At last, as she was about to tap on the window, the king stepped out and tenderly assisted the princess to alight.

They had one more wild embrace, and Ena, bathed in tears, rushed to bury herself in the seclusion of her mother's motor.

LAUGHING HYENAS HAD ROARING TIME

Circus With a Gory Record
for Violence on the
High Seas.

New York, May 15.—Frank C. Boock's animal circus, one of the biggest consignments of animals ever entering port, arrived yesterday on the Phoenix liner St. Andrew from Antwerp. The ship had a fearful trip, and there was something doing every day. The billows pitched the vessel about, there was a meat famine on board, and the beasts tried in their hunger to eat up one another.

On board were two laughing hyenas, which made sport of the misery of their companions, 10 ordinary hyenas, 30 lions, 45 bears, 5 chimpanzees, 11 lions, 15 Great Danes, Caesar, a royal Bengal tiger, featured as the "biggest and most ferocious" ever; Menelik, the biggest lion; 25 pumas, horses, ponies and birds, a sacred tattooed bull, and a horse that carries around the ring a lion on its back.

There are thirty-four trainers, including a woman and Spezzido, with a troupe of eleven small bears in a comedy act. Matt Johnson was the boss of the circus wonders, May 2 and 3 being the worst days of the trip. Red-dyed rations put the animals in a nasty temper, and the pulling of the ship shifted the cages.

On the night of May 2 a Russian wolf fought with its cage mate over an allowance of meat. The fight lasted ten minutes or until one of the wolves was killed. The victor then broke through the bars, which had been loosened in the struggle, rushed by the companionway, and leaped over the side. On the same day Victor, a lion, killed a lioness, Madame.

One of the most savage pumas forced the bars and attacked an elephant. The elephant wound its trunk around the neck of the cowardly puma, and stamped upon the beast until it was dead. In the same cage a polar bear cuffed a greedy hyena around until the mean fellow decided to be good.

While the meat famine was on the keepers wanted Capt. Fitzgerald to stop the ship and fish for whales, but he said he would not tolerate such cruelty to the whales.

FORBES WON'T QUIT

Oxford County Jail Turnkey Insists
Upon Being Discharged.

Woodstock, Ont., May 14.—Turnkey James Forbes, of the Oxford county jail, has been asked for his resignation but flatly refuses to give up his job until he is summarily discharged. He demands that an investigation of his conduct be made. While no reasons are officially stated for the action taken against Mr. Forbes, it is said that his too strong participation in the last general election is one of the reasons for which he is asked to get out. It is said also that his successor has been chosen by Donald Sutherland, M. P., for South Oxford, and is a man from that constituency.

MANITOBA AND PHONES

Question of Jurisdiction Now Being
Considered by Dominion Govt.

Ottawa, May 14.—In the Commons today, Dr. Roche (Conservative, Marquette), asked: Has the Government taken into consideration the memorial sent to the Governor-General-in-Council, and the one presented to Parliament by the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Manitoba, praying that an act may be passed permitting the Government of Manitoba, when authorized by the assembly, to appropriate existing lines of telephone within that province? If so, is it the intention of the Government to introduce such an act at this session of Parliament?

To the first part of the question the Prime Minister's answer was, Yes. As to the second part it was stated that the question of jurisdiction had to be considered, and the Minister of Justice was now studying the matter.

Mr. Lennox, Conservative of South Simcoe, asked the following: What was the date of the retailer of Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, K.C., postmaster-general, as counsel in the case of the Toronto Street Railway vs. the City of Toronto, recently heard in the supreme court of Canada, and referred to in the debate on April 18 and May 7, 1906, by the honorable the Postmaster-General and Mr. Lennox, in the discussion of Mr. Lennox's motion, re ministers of the crown and other practicing in courts of law?

The Prime Minister declined to answer, on the ground that it was not in order, and further, it related to matters of a private nature concerning which the Government had no information.

GO TO BRITISH COMPANY

Mutual Life's Policies Held in Great
Britain Taken Over.

London, May 14.—An important development has taken place in connection with the interests of policyholders of the Mutual Life Insurance Company, of New York, living in Great Britain. Last week the North British and Mercantile Insurance Company proposed to take over the New York Mutual Life's holders' interests on the payment of the same premium they are now paying, without further medical examination, and with liberal participation in the profits of the company. This was found to be practicable with regard to policies representing \$46,000,000 and subject to immediate full surrender value. With regard to unmaturing policies the North British and Mercantile Company declared it was prepared to negotiate for these on liberal terms.

D. C. Haldeman, former manager in London for the Mutual Life, submitted the proposals of the North British and Mercantile Company to the committee of holders presided over by Lord St. Oswald, and the committee unanimously resolved to support them. Mr. Haldeman will join the North British and Mercantile Company as joint manager of its life department, and will transfer a portion of his old staff to that company.

A NEW CHINATOWN

Chinese Quarter Will Flourish on the
Old Site in Frisco.

San Francisco, May 14.—Those who thought the destruction of the Chinese quarter of San Francisco was the one good feature of the terrible disaster, are doomed to disappointment. The notorious resorts will soon flourish again. A westerner sums up the situation in this way:

"The man who believes these dreams about Chinatown being eliminated from the new San Francisco, or shifted to some other site, is more optimistic than the people of San Francisco.

"Chinatown has a pull that is strong enough to twist Market street into a figure eight. The Chinese may not vote, but they have money, which cannot only be used to buy votes, but automobiles, houses on Van Ness avenue and racing stables for those in power in San Francisco.

Chinatown, in all human probability, will be rebuilt right where it was before.

"There's a reason for this the man who hasn't lived in San Francisco would not guess. Under Chinatown there was a subway city that had a larger population than the rookeries above the surface.

"These tunnels, passages and halls still exist. Many of them were built about by the earthquake; nearly all were built at the entrances by the burning brick and completely. They can be straightened out, however, much more easily than another underground city could be constructed.

"In this village of troglodytes fostered the cancer spot that the righteous of San Francisco tried for years to abolish. Here were the gambling dens, the gathering places of the tongs and the cages in which were kept the little Chinese women, who were sold with a regularity that spoke well for the industry and commercial instincts of our consuls in China. There were probably hundreds of these little creatures burned to death the day of the fire. Their bones will be dug out, however, the stone walls of the passages will be strengthened, the walls will be shored up and the first section of the burned-over part of the city to be occupied will be this city of caves.

"They will build the houses above ground as they are required. They will pay no attention to the demands for the setting of Chinatown without the city walls and as long as San Francisco is in the hands of the present political masters it can be counted on to see that the Chinamen will stay where they have been for more years than the Frisco people like to recall."
