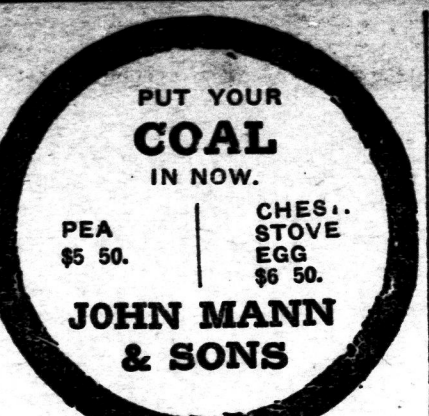

MERCURY IS HOVERING AROUND 40 MARK

Rather Cool Weather for the Month of May.

The weatherman is indulging in another of his pranks and once more London is shivering, while the mercury hovers around the 40 mark. Arctic winds and lowering skies are incidental to the visitation. The temperature dropped to 38.5 last night, and prospects for immediate warmer weather are but small. Cool, westerly winds, with local showers, is the unwelcome information handed out by the weather bureau.

EMPLOYERS AND MEN HAVE COME TO TERMS

There Will Be No Strike of the Bricklayers On Wednesday.

Meetings of the master bricklayers of the city and of the arbitration committee of the union bricklayers were held last night and the master bricklayers asked the men to work along under the present schedule for another year, as building conditions in the city are such that they do not warrant entering into a three-year agreement, raising each year until a maximum scale of 50 cents an hour is reached.

No Strike. The committee decided to acquiesce in the request and no strike will be called tomorrow.

For some time the master bricklayers have been trying to get the master bricklayers to agree to a new schedule. The present scale is 45 cents an hour, and they asked that the wage be raised to 47 cents this year and in proportion each year for three years until 50 cents an hour was reached.

Building is somewhat quiet in London this season and the contractors do not see their way clear to meet the demands of the men and told them so. There was some talk of a strike, but as a result of last night's meetings this has been prevented and the present scale will be adhered to for another year.

APPOINTMENT OF MISS HOTSON Miss Maud Hotson, a former kindergarten director, of this city, who resigned when double sessions were instituted in the city schools, has just been appointed a lecturer by Mr. Putnam, who has charge of the Women's Institutes of the Province of Ontario. Miss Hotson will address the Women's Institutes of Prince Edward County, Haldimand and East York, on "The Care and Training of Children."

BUILDERS TO PAY FOR WATER IN ADVANCE

Water Commissioners Have Been Beat Out of Much Money in the Past.

The water commissioners are after for some time it has been the custom of contractors to apply for water to be used in the construction of buildings, and it has been turned on.

Of late, a large number have refused or neglected to pay the rates. Now this water will be turned on, nor the building permit issued, until the water rates have been paid. "We have always collected after the building was finished," said Secretary of the Ellwood Water Works, "but that has not worked satisfactorily, and now we are going to get the money first. We have arranged so that no building permit will be issued until the water is paid for."

REV. DR. TEASDALE'S WORK BROUGHT TO CLOSE

Aged Clergyman Died Today After a Long Illness.

After an illness extending over some weeks, Rev. Dr. Teasdale, formerly assistant pastor at the Dundas Centre Methodist Church, died at 1:30 this morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Letteney, 379 Maitland street.

Dr. Teasdale had been critically ill for some days, and his death had been expected at any time. He was suffering from a general breakdown. The late Dr. Teasdale was particularly well known throughout the Maritime Provinces, where he worked for many years, and where he won the reputation of being one of the foremost Methodist preachers. For seven years he was in the city of Halifax, and later preached in St. John, N. B., for three years. He had also held pastorate in Fredericton, N. B., and at Yarmouth, N. S. About ten years ago he was forced to give up his pastorate at Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, owing to ill health and upon his retirement was superannuated. Five years ago he came to London and took an active interest in the work of the Dundas Centre Church, for the last year and a half Dr. Teasdale had been in failing health. Last year he started on a trip to the west intending to visit a daughter there, but ill health caused him to give up the intended visit. Since Christmas of last year his condition grew steadily worse, and he became so weak that an operation that the physicians intended to perform was not attempted.

Dr. Teasdale was 73 years old, and had been preaching continuously for 48 years, and in that time had preached throughout Western Ontario and the Maritimes. Besides his wife, Dr. Teasdale is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Letteney, of this city, with whom he resided; Mrs. (Rev.) David Fleming, of Dauphin, Man., and Mrs. R. Mills, of Milton. Mr. and Mrs. Teasdale would have celebrated their golden wedding in another year. The funeral will be held on Thursday afternoon to Mount Pleasant Cemetery, and Rev. Dr. Manning, of the Dundas Centre Church, will conduct the services.

FOURTEEN YOUNG MEN WILL BE ORDAINED

Service Will Be Conducted in St. Paul's by His Lordship Bishop Williams.

At St. Paul's Cathedral on Sunday morning next eight young men of Huron College will be ordained by His Lordship Bishop Williams as deacons and six as priests. The candidates for the order of deacons will be A. G. Clarke, who goes to St. James' Episcopal Church, South London, as assistant to Very Rev. Dean Davis; R. W. James, Alex. G. Currie, who goes to St. George's, St. Catharines; Harry B. Ashby, E. H. Heaven, Joseph Tully and A. E. Taylor. Mr. Taylor is a graduate of Wycliffe College, and his home is in Peterboro, but he will be ordained as a priest at St. James' Church. Rev. John Morris, formerly assistant at the Memorial Church, who goes to Leamington, and Rev. W. H. Hutton, of Thorndale, will be ordained as deacons. Rev. W. G. Blackwell and Charles C. Brett, of Huron College, leave Thursday for the Yukon. Mr. Brett will be ordained at White Horse on June 19, and will work in the Teslin Lake district, and Mr. Blackwell goes to Dawson City, where he will be ordained.

TRIAL TRIP OF NEW STEAMER ROCHESTER

On Saturday last the new steamer Rochester, of the Canadian Navigation Company of the United States, sailed on her trial trip from the Detroit Shipbuilding Yards. The Rochester is a model of marine architecture and design, and for her beautiful lines and spacious accommodations. Ascending by the main staircase the main saloon is reached, both sides of which are taken up with staterooms, many fitted with brass beds with bath and toilet rooms. At the bow and stern are large open decks. The gallery tier of staterooms is arranged in the same way as the main saloon, and above this are found the ladies' parlor, buffet and smoking room. The ladies' room is beautifully decorated in cream and pink, in art nouveau style. The smoking room is paneled in oak. Both rooms have large windows, affording an unobstructed view of the scenery.

The decorations of the entire steamer are original and harmonious, having been designed by Louis Kiel, of the Detroit Shipbuilding Company. The lighting is most artistic, all the fixtures being especially designed to blend with the architectural features. A quietude entered on board and most enjoyable time was spent. Among those present were Mr. Thos. Henry, traffic manager; H. M. Molson, C. J. Smith, general manager; P. Percy Smith, secretary; H. Foster, chief assistant general passenger agent, and Mr. Hugh D. Paterson, travelling passenger agent, and also about one hundred and fifty of the transportation agents from the various parts of the United States and Canada. A most enjoyable time was spent. Mr. F. B. Clarke, ticket agent, for the Rochester and Ontario Navigation, London, Ont., was also one of the guests.

RAINFALL IN MAY WAS VERY LIGHT

Only 2.67 Inches Fell During the Present Month.

The monthly weather report shows that May, 1910, differed in many respects from May of 1909.

May of this year will not go down in history as a particularly warm or cold month, but it is somewhat unique in that only 2.67 inches of rainfall were experienced, almost an inch less than last year, and over two inches less than 1908. The figures for 1909 are 3.61, and for 1908, 4.74.

The temperature did not perform any aerial stunts and fell five and a half degrees short of last year's highest mark in the month of May. On the 21st the highest point was reached at 78.5, compared with 84 last year. On the 15th the lowest point was recorded, 27. Last year's lowest was 29. The month throughout has been one of changes. First a spell of cold weather, then a period of warm weather following each other in regular rotation.

Nicholls admitted the theft and was remanded for a week for sentence. He has appeared several times recently for being drunk.

It is stated that Bailey was in a somewhat inebriated condition, and that Nicholls walked up to him and abstracted the watch when he wasn't looking.
