David Star Jordan Says Revulsion Against War Exists.

[Special to The Advertiser.] DETROIT, Mich., June 18 .- "When ever the German people take control of their Government, then there will be an end to international war," declared Dr. David Starr Jordan, former head of Leland Stanford University and noted pacifist, today. The present struggle, Dr. Jordan contends, is the result of six years of plotting and conspiracy by

Dr. Jordan resigned his place with the university to become a director of the Million-Dollar Peace Foundation, es-tablished by G. Edward Ginn. Mr. Ginn, a publisher, died a year ago.
At present, Dr. Jordan believes, there

is hope for universal peace, not much, he conceded, but still hope that it will come eventually. World peace, he holds, is merely a matter of education. As proof he cites the increasing diffiwith which wars are begun.

Jordan had little to say, pleading a reluctance to discuss motives of which he was in ignorance. "There was nothing in the note of President Wilson to justify such action. 
