WOUNDED SOLDIERS
WONDERFULLY BRAVE,
SAYS NURSING SISTER

Miss Agnes Davis Just Back
From Work in France.

SUFFERED BREAKDOWN

Severe Strain of Months of
Heavy Work Told on
London Girl.

That it is almost beyond human
conception to appreciate the wonder-
ful fortitude and patience with which
wounded soldiers bear up under the
strain while in the hospitals near the
front, was the idea conveyed by Miss
Agnes Davis of 472 English street, a
nursing sister who returned to this
city yesterday.

Miss Davis went with the first con-
tingent, and spent the first winter at
Ruford, Salisbury Plain, in England,
where her work was principally with
convalescent soldiers.

In February, 1915, she was trans-
ferred to Taplow, Buckinghamshire, to
the Canadian Red Cross Hospital, the
matron in charge being Miss Edith
Campbell of Ottawa.

Miss Davis was one of five who or-
ganized the "Duchess of Connaught
Canadian Red Cross Hospital."

Remained at Taplow until May, 1915,
their own unit, No. 2 Canadian Gen-
eral Hospital, in charge of Col. Byles,
was ordered to France, the hospital be-
ing located at La Traportie, on the
French coast, near Dieppe.

This town Miss Davis described as
being a beautiful situation for a hospi-
tal, situated on the white chalk cliffs
300 feet above the sea level.

The hospital had a capacity of 1,000
beds, all of which were constantly in
use.

During her stay at La Traportie, to
which hospital she and her sister, Miss
Davis, direct from the trenches, Miss Davis
witnessed many heartrending scenes,
in addition to the wonderful exhibitions
of bravery of the wounded men un-
der such trying circumstances.

Nervous Breakdown.
Owing to the excessive strain con-
nected with her work, Miss Davis suf-
fered a complete nervous breakdown,
and in December, 1915, she was in-
valided to England, where she had
since remained prior to leaving for
Canada a week ago.

Miss Davis was accompanied by
Nursing Sister F. M. Nichols of Paris,
Ont., who has returned to her home
on sick leave.

Miss Davis will remain at the home
of her brother, Mr. James Davis, of
472 English street for a time.

FEEDING CAMP IS
GIGANTIC TASK OF
A. S. C. DETACHMENT

Making Record, Too, in Hand-
ling It.

FAR BELOW ALLOTMENT

72 Men and 12 Wagons Do-
ing Work of 400 Men and
81 Wagons.

To supply practically three brigades,
more than 9,000 men, with a complement
of only half a company, about 72 men
and twelve wagons, is the work of the
Army Service Corps detachment at the
big camp.

Regular army regulations allow one
company of the A. S. C. with 27 wagons
to each brigade, so that the local com-
pany is doing the work of over 400 men
and 81 wagons. This, Lieut. R. M.
Johnston, chief supply officer, claims to
be a record of which the A. S. C. is
justifiably proud.

Two large sheds, each 80x30 in di-
mension house the supplies for the camp.
In and out of these sheds with clock-
like precision move the tons of establish-
ment that find their way to the "dixies" and
finally to the tables of the men's mess
tents. And the materials are of the
finest, the same as anyone would be glad
to find on a table at a restaurant.
Sugar, bacon, bread, jam, butter, coffee,
tea and cheese from the biggest fac-
tories and most reliable dealers in the
country. These and other things are
apportioned out to the battalions in the
quantities called for in the parade
state.

The parade state is a document made
out at battalion headquarters, and
shows among other things the exact
strength of the unit on any one day.
This is sent to the A. S. C. which weigh
out the exact regulation quantity for
the total number of men in each unit.
If the men do not eat today, it is eaten to-
morrow with the exception of fresh meat
and butter. These are supplied the day
they are eaten, the butter being kept in
an ice-box built into one of the A. S. C.
buildings for the purpose.

Here is a list of the different articles
supplied and the quantity allowed each
man:

Bread 1 lb.
Potatoes 1 lb.
Vegetables 6 oz.
Bacon 3 oz.
Jam 2 oz.
Beans 2 oz.
Butter 2 oz.
Kilim (powdered milk) 1 lb.
Cheese 6 oz.
Salt 1/2 oz.
Split Peas 1/2 oz.
Coffee 1/3 oz.
Tea 1/4 oz.
Pepper 1/4 oz.

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they are eaten, the butter being kept in
an ice-box built into one of the A. S. C.
buildings for the purpose.

In addition, each unit runs its own
canteen, the funds derived there-
from may be expended on any luxuries
the men may fancy.

Totalling up the above weights, it will
be seen that each man is supplied with
food weighing almost 4 1/2 pounds. This,
it is figured, should be enough for a
man engaged even in the hard work of a
soldier performs.

Two Days' Supplies on One.
On Saturday the A. S. C. works over-
time, as two days' supplies must be
handed. Then more than 51 tons of
foodstuffs in the estimated weight of
that day's supplies. This, it is claimed,
is all delivered before noon on Satur-
day.

The unit requires 30 more men, and
is out after them.

Lieut.-Col. William Cole is chief A.
S. C. officer in this district. Major Frank
Spory is A. D. of S. and T. and Lieut.
R. M. Johnston, chief supply officer.

ARTISTIC DESIGNS
IN 142ND CAMP

Lack of Natural Beauty Overcome by
Attractive Work.

Although the natural beauty of the
142nd Battalion's camp ground may not
be as great as that occupied by other
battalions, the "artists" in the bat-
talion do not lose time in making many
improvements.

Whitewashed stones now mark out
many paths and proclaim the uses of
nearly all the large trees. London boys
have so shown a great originality
as those from any other section of the
country. One platoon boasts a maple
leaf perfectly marked out with glister-
ing white pebbles.

Other original designs can also be
seen down the lines. A few are going
in for color schemes, and have used
colored marbles for marking out the
name of their companies and platoons.

The stretcherbearer section also has
made a departure from the general rule
of using only whitewashed stones in
designs. The boys there have worked
several bright red crosses into a design
before their section of the camp.

ANOTHER MEMBER OF
FIRST 33RD DETACHED
COMPANY IS WOUNDED

Pte. Horace Martin, No. 608, who ap-
peared in the casualty lists this week
as having been wounded. Pte. Martin

left with the first
detached company
of the 33rd Batta-
lion, and has been
in the trenches
since August of
last year.

He is a native of
England, but had
resided in Canada
for some time. Be-
fore enlisting he
was employed by
the Holeproof Hos-
iery Company of
this city, and gave
up his position to
enlist at the early

part of the war. Pte. Fred Martin
of the 135th Battalion, now quartered
at Carling Heights, is a brother.

NEXT WEEK'S DRILL

The syllabus for next week's drill of
all infantry battalions of No. 1 Military
District has been announced by Lieut.-
Col. H. D. Smith, general staff officer,
as follows:

Daily, except Wednesday and Satur-
day:
Physical training 1 hour
Bayonet fighting 1 hour
Extended-order drill by signal 1 hour
Company casualty drill 1 1/2 hours
Platoon, company and battalion drill
and training, training to
consist of preliminary work in
advance guards and outposts. 1 1/2 hours
Total 6 hours

In company casualty drill, officers and
N. C. O.'s should be made to fall out,
and junior ranks should be given com-
mand to encourage them to learn their
duties and be ready to take over com-
mand at a moment's notice, should oc-
casion arise.

Platoon, company and battalion drill
and training will be carried on as fol-
lows:

On one day, battalion drill during the
period allotted, two days' platoon and
company training, period for the re-
maining day to be devoted to advance
guards and outposts.

Company officers are responsible for
the training of their companies and
must be allowed to take full charge of
their companies in such a way as to
develop the initiative of company, platoon
and section commanders.

Wednesday morning—
Physical drill 1 hour
Bayonet fighting 1 hour
Company casualty training 1 hour
Afternoon—
Route march (detailed orders to be
issued later).

Saturday (9 a.m. to 12:15 p.m.)—
Physical training 1 hour
Guards, sentries and saluting 2 hours

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WINDSOR RECEIVES
ORDERS TO PREPARE
CAMP FOR KILTIES

Border City Almost Certain of
Having New 241st Unit—
91st Battalion Is Dined by
St. Thomas I. O. O. E.

WINDSOR, June 15.—Instructions
were received today from militia head-
quarters at London to prepare a camp
for the 241st Battalion, Canadian Scot-
tish Borderers, to be commanded by
Lieut.-Col. Walter McGregor.

Recruiting has not started yet for
the Highland battalion. Col. McGregor
is waiting to get the list of officers
confirmed and the establishment com-
pleted. He wants to have everything
in readiness when enlistment begins.
There may be delay in getting full
Highland equipment, as it is reported
that material for kilts cannot be secured
for some time.

It has not been definitely decided
where the camp will be located, as
Walkerville is making a bid for it, but
it is likely to be on the east side of
Dowgall avenue, north of the Tecumseh
road.

The Engineers, with Major Mitchell,
Lieuts. Brian, Woollett, Jacques and
Hatcher in charge, will have complete
charge in laying out the grounds, in-
stalling water and light service and
otherwise making the camp ready for
the Highland battalion.
