


Three Dies On Gallows

This Morning. INSTANTANEOUS DEATH Arrangements Made by Official Hangman Carried Out Without Hitch.


Hamilton, Dec. 19.--Paul Kowalski, convicted of the murder of Knot Trem-luck, and slayer of County Constable A. C. Springstead and Chief Turnkey Arthur Awty, of the local tail, rold the A. C. The trap in the gallows was sprung by Hangman Eilis at 7:56 a.m. and at 8:03 Dr. James Roberts, medi-cal health officer, pronounced life ex-tinct. Thirteen minutes after the trap was sprung the body was cut down tinct. Thirteen minutes after the trap was sprung the body was cut down and carried into the jail for the post mortem. This disclosed the fact that death had been instantaneous. Kowal-ski's neck and jaw having been broken by the drop. At 7:53, his arms pinioned behind his back and his ankies shackled, Kowalski shuffled towards the gallows, sobbing while the priest uttered words of encouragement. In the death chamber the condemned man reached out his manacled hands for a parting handshake with one of the guards.






