RAPS GIVING OF DOLES TO HELP WORKLESS MEN

**Canadian Conference On
Labor Conditions Finds Un-
employment Peak Past.**
ADVOCATES REGULATION
**Urges Industrial Co-operation
To Distribute Work Over
Entire Year.**

OTTAWA, Sept. 7.—(By Canadian
Press.)—Condemning the practice of
handing out unemployment doles, de-
claring the belief that the peak of
unemployment is now passed, and
that no additional means for dealing
with it are necessary, and enunciating
the principle "that the problem of
unemployment is primarily one of
industry and that every effort should
be made in industry to prevent the
occurrence of unemployment," the
national conference on unemployment
came to a close shortly before mid-
night.

All day the delegates had sat behind
closed doors, and it was not until
after 11 o'clock that they began to
emerge, some of them hurrying to
catch the night trains. Hon. James
Murdoch, minister of labor, handed
out two resolutions which had been
passed unanimously by the confer-
ence. He was asked specifically with
regard to the attitude of the confer-
ence on doles.

"The conference," he said, "ex-
pressed the opinion that the practice
of handing out doles is wrong in
principle and often harmful in ef-
fect, and should not be resorted to
until all other measures have failed."
The first resolution handed to the
press by Mr. Murdoch, which, he
said, had received the unanimous
indorsement of the conference, is as
follows:

Urges Regulation.
"In connection with the attention
which has been given by this confer-
ence to the subject of unemployment
and the measures which may be
deemed necessary by the public au-
thorities in Canada to provide for the
relief of unemployed persons, the
conference hereby places on record as
an expression of its views: That the
problem of unemployment is primar-
ily one of industry and that every
effort should be made in industry to
prevent the occurrence of unem-
ployment."

"It is recognized that the causes
of unemployment in some cases may
be outside of particular industries and
in part due to causes which are
international. This conference, how-
ever, urges upon those engaged in in-
dustry the necessity of regulating
employment in the interests alike of
employer and employee."

The second resolution, which was
moved by Hon. R. E. Fynn and second-
ed by C. W. Robinson, also received
the unanimous indorsement of the
conference.

"Whereas, in departments of govern-
ment, both federal and local, there are
avenues open for employment;
and
"Whereas, the Canadian National
Railway board is the manager and
operator of the Canadian National
Railway and Canadian government
system; and
Whereas, there are boards admin-
istering under legislative authority—
special departments of public works
in the various provinces; and
Unanimity Claimed.

"Whereas, there are recurring peri-
ods of unemployment; there, this
conference recommends that the
respective governments, the Nation-
al Railway board and the boards admin-
istering the special departments of
public work and railway operation so
as to distribute the work in such a
manner as to relieve unemployment
to the greatest possible extent
throughout Canada."

It was stated that there had been
unanimity on all the points men-
tioned. The unemployment situation
was thoroughly canvassed and the
difficulties of the various provinces
discussed.

question discussed, namely, the mat-
ter of baptism. It was pointed out
that individuals in the laity had dif-
ferent convictions on the question.
Some held that "Christening" did not
mean "baptizing." There was the
impression that in the case of in-
fants who were baptized by sprink-
ling, or pouring, that the child was
only christened, and upon reaching
adult age would have to be "baptized"
by immersion. This Rev. Mr.
Drake pointed out, was a matter for
the ministry to set right in the minds
of the people. "The standards of the
Church," said Rev. Drake, "and the
private convictions in a man's mind,
are two different things." The speak-
er claimed that the reason the church
was not strong in Nova Scotia could
be traced to the above cause.

The same thing applied to the western
provinces. "Suppose every man were
guided by his own convictions," con-
tinued the speaker, "what kind of a
church would we have. Christ set
certain standards and delegated the
teaching of them to his ministry."

Rev. Mr. Drake went on to show
how inconsistent it was to teach that
the baptism of an infant was valid,
and then in fifteen or twenty years,
to invalidate that baptism by baptiz-
ing the person over again by immer-
sion. "Of course," said Rev. Mr.
Drake, "there can be no rule cov-
ering every case. In doubtful cases,
for instance where the person is not
sure whether he was baptized in in-
fancy, the minister should use his
judgment. The rule of infant baptism
was upheld. "Unless we become as
little children," quoted Mr. Drake, "ye
shall in nowise enter the Kingdom of
God."

There were some minor details
attended to in the form used in tak-
ing new members into the church.
It was decided to add a form for

receiving probationers to the discip-
line.

Makes Plea For Funds.
Rev. Mr. Drake before adjourning
made a plea for funds, stating that
the need for money was never more
urgent than now. Aside from the ex-
penses incidental to carrying on the
convention, there were many other
expenses, stated the speaker, the most
urgent of which was the paying for
the new church, bought recently at
229 Maitland street. The congrega-
tion was a comparatively small one,
and any outside contributions would
be gratefully appreciated. "We are
aiming at an objective of \$50,000,"
said the speaker in concluding, "an
amount not large, but which will be
used to the best advantage."

Friday afternoon, it was announced,
the work would consist mainly in a
survey of the church. In the evening,
the Rev. R. B. Ball, representative of
the African Methodist Episcopal
Church, a visitor from Hart-
ford, Conn., will address the assem-
bly, bringing official greetings from
his church. Rev. I. H. Jackson and
Rev. Mr. Stuart will reply. The re-
mainder of the evening will be de-
voted to general discussion.

That the next two or three years
would be trying ones for prohibition,
was the statement Mrs. Wright, wife
of the national president of the W. C. T. U.,
made at the Thursday evening ses-
sion of the convention. Mrs. Wright
touched on the responsibility of the
church, and urged the members to
bring their hearers to do their part
well. The laws relating to prohibi-
tion, stated Mrs. Wright, were good
in themselves, but the trouble seemed
to be in the enforcement of the law.
Mrs. Richardson, a lay delegate from
Toronto, also spoke.

Re-Elected to Office.
Re-elected for a third four-year
term to the office of general superin-
tendent of the British Methodist
Episcopal Church in Canada, Rev. S.
Episcopal Church, signifying his will-
ingness to continue his duties, re-
ceived the most enthusiastic applause
at the first day's session of the six-
teenth general quadrennial confer-
ence, which opened Wednesday at the
B. M. E. Church, Grey street.

In a financial statement presented
by Rev. I. H. Edwards, treasurer,
during the past four years, the finan-
cial condition of the church was
shown to be good.

Mr. Edwards stated that while the
financial condition of the church had
a just call on funds, a considerable
portion had been given to aid the
Woman's Missionary Society.

Rev. Ball Presides.
The conference will occupy the
remainder of this week and Monday
next. Rev. R. A. Ball of Toronto pre-
sided over the elections held in the
afternoon.

Rev. Thomas H. Jackson of Guelph
becomes the new general secretary.

The financial board will be as fol-
lows: Rev. R. A. Ball, president; Rev.
I. H. Edwards of Windsor, secretary,
and Frank M. Edmonds of Windsor,
treasurer.

That there is a cordial feeling
growing in the church towards out-
side bodies was evidenced by the
presence of Rev. Dr. R. R. Ball of
Hartford, Conn. Rev. Mr. Ball, who
will address the conference Friday
night, expressed the good wishes his
church, the Zion African Methodist
Church, had for their Canadian
friends.

**CALLS FOR HOSPITAL FOR
MONTREAL DRUG ADDICTS**
Dr. Amyot, In Speech, Advises Es-
tablishment of Institution In City.

Montreal, Sept. 8.—Montreal should
have a hospital for drug addicts, de-
clared Dr. J. A. Amyot, C. M. G., deputy
minister of health, who was among
the speakers at the formal
opening of the hygiene section of the
congress of French-speaking physi-
cians of North America, in the
Sulimian Library Hall yesterday after-
noon.

"I do not wish to imply that Mon-
real is especially wicked or worse
than any other city," said Dr. Amyot,
"but it is a large commercial center
and a big open port, and has become
the center of drug traffickers in these
parts. There are, unfortunately, very
many drug addicts in Montreal. They
should not be regarded as enemies of
society, as bad people, but as suf-
ferers from a craving which makes
a wreck of a healthy man in a short
time. Their place is in an institu-
tion, for they cannot be treated in
their homes."

**EXECUTE 48 COSSACKS
FOR AIDING REBELLION**
Moscow, Sept. 8.—The forty-eight
Cossacks recently convicted in Kiev
in connection with an uprising
against the Ukrainian government,
have been executed, appeals entered
in their behalf having been denied.

The Moscow government has
stayed the execution of eight con-
victed revolutionists condemned at Sim-
feropol.

GIVES CURE FOR BUILDING TRADE

**John David, at Kiwanis Club,
Tells of Contractors'
Problems.**
**Calls for More Co-operation
in Life and Less Indi-
vidualism.**

"Expand the lines of limitation in
the building trade, and you will have
removed the lack of continuity of em-
ployment, the greatest evil in the in-
dustry," has to say, Nicholas J.
Kennedy, of the John J. David Co.,
Detroit, said Friday, addressing the
noon luncheon meeting of the Ki-
wanis Club.

"Simplicity no longer holds in the
building industry. A big job today
calls for at least forty different sorts
of mechanics, and the trade is so
split up with restrictions and limita-
tions that almost at one time all the
plumber did was to lay pipe, now
he has become a sort of sanitary en-
gineer, and if pipe is ordinary black
pipe, it takes men of one trade to
do it, yet if the job is the same, but
the pipe galvanized, mechanics of an-
other trade must do it."

Hard to Estimate.
"If a contractor could estimate the
number of men, he could take on a
job to carry it through to the end, the
cost of building would decrease rap-
idly, but when his bricklayers have
finished laying bricks he must lay
them off, even though he could use
them at finishing off cement floors,
Carpenters, for instance, are a
handy unit with a crowd could do. If
a door is metal, a metal worker must
be taken on to hang it, and the car-
penter who used to consider hanging
doors as part of his particular work
must go and seek another job."

Facing his remarks on the building
trade with ideas on conditions in
general, "There are no Sir John A.
Macdonalds in this country, or Abra-
ham Lincolns across the border," Mr.
Kennedy said.

"People are beginning to realize
that there are too many leaders with
limitations and too few genuinely
brave and single-purposed men at the
head."

Lack of Followers.
"And there are no real honest-to-
godness followers. Individualism is
asserting itself to such an extent that
there is lack of co-operation unless
we realize this and stabilize our in-
dustries and commerce, the general
confusion resulting is going to carry
us into disaster."

"The building trade is the barom-
eter of general conditions every-
where," he concluded. "It is the most
important factor in the economic
situation everywhere, and as such, it
demands that the people as a whole
stand back of it."
