London, June 7.-A special from Shanghai, dated June 6, says: "The members of the British legation at Pekin are sending their families away. It is also said that prominent Chinese residents are leaving the city. There is an unconfirmed report that two Russian engineers have been murdered at Yu Chow Fu, northwest of Port Arthur.

The total damage done to the Chinese railroads by the Boxers is estimated at \$5,000,000.
