Will be placed in operation with a total capacity of 3,600 tons of ore daily. Word has been received here that the second half of the 60 drill air compressor, the first half of which has already arrived, will be shipped from Sherbrooke, Quebec, by Christmas. This second half will probably be ready for use a month later than the first half. This week the Snowshoe mine made the record shipment of any single week in the mine's history, sending out to the smelters 1,410 tons of ore. Thus far this year the Snowshoe has shipped 15,000 tons of ore, and from now on the rate will be somewhat increased, and as soon as the Boundary Creek smelters can handle it, the rate will be doubled. Porter Bros., who have been at work on a stripping contract for the Granby mines, have at last completed the work for the winter, and have stored the tools and paraphernalia. They have uncovied something over 15,000 cubic yards of material, and have deposited it away from the ore body.

Havana, Dec. 1.—At a meeting of the cabinet today, Secretary of Instruction Yero was appointed secretary of government in place of Diego Tamayo, and Leopoldo Gancio, formerly secretary of finance, under General Wood's administration, was appointed Secretary of Instruction in succession to Senor Yero. Senor Gancio has not been identified with either of the political parties. The report of the Secretary of Finance for the month of November gives the customs revenues at Havana as \$1.004,833, a decrease of \$199,000 compared with the October returns, and the total receipts for the island as \$1,156.871. The cash in hand amounted to \$1,743,-243.
