NEW RICHMOND

An interesting, instructive and enjoyable Convention of the Protestant Teachers of the Municipalities of New Richmond and Maria, was held on the 23rd inst. in the New Richmond Model School.

The Conference was under the leadership of Rev. J. M. Sutherland, Inspector of schools for the province.

The following teachers and visitors were present:—Miss Cleland, (Principal of New Richmond Model School), gauge told of the good start that he Division, M. G. Harvey, H. Gallan, B. Montgomery, E. Thorburn, J. M. Bechervaise, M. Carter, E. Montgomery, Chisholm, Smollett and Mesdames J. Henry and MacWhirter.

The Conference opened with devotional exercises, followed with an inspiring address on "Patriotism" by the Inspector.

After a short discussion on the "Course of Study" and the "Visitor's Registers," Mrs. MacWhirter read an article entitled "Point à Bourdeaux."

An address by the Inspector on the "Art of Teaching" came next. The address showed that among other essentials, the teacher required sympathy with children, love for the work of teaching, hopefulness, patience, perseverance, forbearance, cheerfulness, a knowledge of the pupils, of the subjects, and of the methods of teaching.

Miss Cleland gave an excellent paper in French: "La Méthode directe," followed by black board illustration, intended to show the advantages of using the language during the lesson.

The afternoon session opened with a discussion on agriculture; the advantages, etc., of school gardens; school libraries, and the care of these; and Forest Preservation. Many hints were given by those participating, among whom was Mr. Alfred Gilker, chairman of the school-commissioners of New Richmond.

Other subjects under discussion were reading, trading of methods and value of clear enunciation, and geography. In line with this subject, the Inspector read an interesting paper on "Fishing Bay," and the projected H. B. Railway.

Miss Carter's interesting and instructive paper on "Drawing" was next on the programme, and Miss Bernice Willett's able paper on "Nature Study" was received with close attention.

DALHOUSIE

Dalhousie, Oct. 28th.—This week will be called patriotic in the annals of Dalhousie. In the first place on Monday evening a very representative meeting of citizens was held in the county court house to organize the town for the Canadian patriotic fund.

On Tuesday evening the ladies of the Institute held another good meeting in St. Mary's Hall and some grand work was done for the good cause.

On Thursday evening there will be a patriotic concert held in the "Star Theatre" and it is expected that the 400 seats that the hall contains will all be occupied.

The meeting held in the County Court House, was presided by Mayor W. S. Montgomery. He fully explained the object of the meeting and introduced A. A. Andrew Esq., Mayor of Campbellton, who in very nice language told of the good start that had been made in Campbellton, towards organizing the whole county of Restigouche for the Canadian Patriotic Fund, and outlined the plans to be followed to carry the work to a successful end in the county. Meetings were to be held in the different parishes, etc. Mr. A. T. LeBlanc spoke next, and referred to the very honorable position the county of Restigouche occupied to-day, having sent fifty young men with the first contingent and according to the new list of names offering to go in the second contingent, the people of this county might well feel proud. He encouraged everybody to do his part in the great cause.

Mr. C. H. LaBillette was called upon to make a few remarks. He said that he had resided in the old Province of Quebec during four years. He had learnt to speak the French language in that province. He had studied its history, and he could say that during the last one hundred and fifty years of British rule, that the people of Quebec had enjoyed every privilege that any people could expect to enjoy under the sun. It was the same with every province in the Dominion of Canada. England in the words of Lord Nelson expected every man to do his duty. The poorest man in the Empire, who could not go to the front, would be assisting the great cause that the empire was fighting for, providing he gave according to his means towards the fund, with the patriotic feeling that he was in sympathy with the cause of freedom, honor and justice. Rev. Dr. J. P. Polley, Rev. A. A. Boucher and Rev. R. J. Coleman delivered brief, but very interesting addresses. The speech making was closed after Mr. A. McDonald, Ex. Mayor of Campbellton, explained about the good work that was being done in the town of Campbellton, and he interested the meeting when he spoke of the interest taken in the Belgian cause.

The following committees were then appointed.

Finance Committee.—A. H. Hilyard, Andrew Loggie, F. McVoy, W. S. Montgomery, W. A. R. Cragg, D. Narcisse Doucet and C. H. LaBillette.

Relief Committee.—Mesdames Daniel McDonald and C. H. LaBillette and Rev. J. F. Polley, Rev. A. A. Boucher, Rev. R. J. Coleman and John B. Delaney.

There was some discussion about the appointment of a Belgian committee, as the meeting has not been called for that purpose. It was finally decided to appoint a committee to assist the ladies who were devoting so much time and energy in the Belgian cause to expedite matters. Messrs. Daniel McDonald, E. Rene Richard, A. J. LeBlanc, James Wallace, Arthur Leeger and Charles McQuarrie were appointed for the Belgian fund.

A vote of thanks was passed to the gentlemen who had come from Campbellton to assist in the meeting, and after the singing of the National Anthem and La Marseillaise, the meeting closed.

There was a good attendance of ladies at the meeting. Mr. E. Rene Richard acted as secretary.

EDITOR'S MAIL BAG

Dalhousie, N. B., 26th Oct., 1914.

The Editor of Graphic, Campbellton,

Dear Sir:—

On the 17th Oct. I submitted the question of Dalhousie water supply and water, to the Provincial Board of Health.

I suggested that Dr. George Melvin, health officer of the City of St. John, be sent here to make a thorough investigation into the whole matter and report to the Board, so that they could act intelligently.

Doctor Melvin holds a degree in public health from McGill University, and is the most competent authority on sanitary affairs, that I know in the Province.

Apart from any analysis, any man with the most rudimentary knowledge of sanitary science, would condemn this well as a town water supply, on account of its situation, the water being drawn from the fact, that when pumped, it dries all the private surface wells within a radius of about three hundred feet.
