R. at Canaan, Thursday night, about midnight, by which Driver John Dalton of Newcastle, ost his life. It appears that the day freight (No. 38) coming to Monetion and the night freight (No. 39) going up had an order to cross at Canaan. Con Heine was in charge of the night freight, and his train arrived at Canaan first. His train had partly entered the siding, which contained several other cars, when Cop. 
