President since 1876, and before that two years vice-president, is the information regarding the official connection of Sir Henry Tyler with the Grand Trunk, which the docile admirers of that versatile gentleman in Canada have been loudly proclaim ing to all whom it may concern. For Sir Henry is now in Canada, and is evidently making good use of the Canadian press for his own honor and glory's sake. If we did not know him so well, we might have been surprised that so blue a tory and so ortho dox a believer should take up in his latter days with wretched Yankee notions. But it is sometimes sweet to be interviewed, and our tory member and anti-Bradlaugh declaimer made full use of opportunity when he was in Mon-Of course he only gave the information which he thought would be good for the public over there and at home,

and the reporter was mightily struck with Sir Henry's candor and frankness, though (he tells us) he possessed the "reticence usual to one with such great responsibilities and involving such important interests." And what was the upshot of the interview, as chronicled in the copious narrative of the Montreal Herald, which has been reproduced in two London papers and doubtless widely distributed among the Grand Trunk shareholders, for all this chimes with Sir Henry's metier? It is somewhat difficult to answer the question. There is abundant laudation of Sir Henry, not only in the Montreal Herald, but also in the Montreal Gazette and in the Shareholder, of which is made available to strengther the faith of sorely-tried stockholders be

the long delay in the realisation of their
hopes. During Sir Henry's terms of office,
says one, "the railway has made marked
progress, probably the most important since
the conception of the enterprise, and has
enjoyed a steadily increasing measure of
success, from the application of the largeminded, skiiful, and enterprising policy deyised and carryed out by him and the exminded, skiiful, and enterprising policy devised and carryed out by him and the executive officers in Canada. Under Sir Henry Tyler's presidency the Chicago and Grand Trunk railway has been constructed and opened, giving the company an independent line to the commercial metropolis of the west, and developing a large and important local and through traffic, and so on, and so on.
