The highest function of the modern newspaper is its power to reach wrongdoers whom even the law fails to reach and to expose them to a punishment greater than any that can be indicted by a judge, namely, the scorn and detestation of their fellow-men. In this Goderich case the wrong-doing was only too apparent. A friendless girl was betrayed to her death. Like many another piece of villainy of a similar kind this one might never have been heard of outside of the limited circle affected by the offence, but the political prominence of one of the parties whose name had been dragged into it made it at least of provincial fame. The World was involved in the dispute as has been shown in the ordinary course of its business as a publisher of news. Mr. Cameron's enemies declared that behind it all was concealed the blackest piece of scoundrelism that had ever been perpetrated in the County of Huron, and that the guilty one was likely by his wealth, power and audacity to terrify all opposition. 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An Erndite Master of Classic Lore Who
Became Chancelfor of the Exchequer.

London, July 28.—The Right Hon.
Robert Lowe, Viscount Sherbrooke, is dead.
He was born in 1811 at Bingham, Worcestershire. He went to Australia and was elected to the Parliament of New South Wales. In 1865 he returned to England, and four years later was appointed vice-president of the Education Board in 1859. He entered the British Parliament as member for Kidderminter, then represented to Caine and finally the University of London. In 1868 he became Chancellor of the Exchequer. He resigned the Chancellorship in 1863 and took charge of the Home Office. In 1874 he went out of office with his party, and in 1880, when the Liberals returned to office, he was raised to the peerage.

Lady Monck Dead.
