An Eminent Master of Classic Lore Who Became Chancellor of the Exchequer.

LONDON, July 28.—The Right Hon. Robert Lowe, Viscount Sandhurst, died at the age of 78, at Charlville, near the residence of Lord Lonsdale in Ireland.

He was born in 1811 in England, and was elected to the Parliament of New South Wales in 1840.

He entered the British Parliament as a member for Kidderminster, then represented the City of London.

He became Chancellor of the Exchequer in 1885, and held the office until 1891.

FIRE, WATER AND HEAT CAUSE MANY DEATHS IN CANADA.
