Uncle Sam May Legalize Bookmaking.

Washington, D.C., March 7.—Representative Heard of Missouri has introduced in the House (by request) a bill amendatory of the act of Jan. 3i, 1883, to more effectually suppress gambling in the District of Columbia to providing that it shall not apply to bookmaking at the spring and fall meetings of any jockey club or other racing association conducted beyond one mile from the limits of the cities of Washington and Georgetown. It provides that such meetings shall take place between March I and Dec. 15, and shall not exceed the period of 18 days each.




