Alderson, But Subsequently Partie Who Know the Woman Stated That the Corpse Was Not Hers-The Inque & Adjourned Until Friday.

An unknown woman was killed on the Grand Trunk Railway near Carlton Junction between 2 and 3 o'clock yesterday morning. The body was taken to the Weston-road Station, and all day long residents of that neighborhood tried in vain to identify the body.

The body is that of a woman between 60 and 70 years of age, with iron-gray 60 and 70 years of age, with iron-gray hair and probably 5 feet 4 inches in-height. She wore a black silk bonnet, trimmed with bead-work and seal brown ribbon. The woman was dressed in black and wore a dark serge Eton jac-ket. She had on prunella boots (No. 4's) very muddy; worn. Around her neck was wrapped a brown woollen scarf, tinged with red. On the third finger of her left hand was a plain gold ring. Four front teeth in the upper jaw were missing. A pocket full of snow apples was found in Is 1t Mrs. Alderson ? her dress pocket.

Is 1t Mrs. Alderson? her dress pocket. The nearest approach to identification is that she may be a Mrs. Alderson, an unfortunate woman whose life of late has been rather dissipated. There are those, however, who state positively that it is not her, although remarkably, re-sembling her. Coroner G. W. The woman was on the "fifth line" trossing, and had had ample warning, but seemed to stand dazed with terror, facing the ap-proaching engine. The crew returned with the engine, and found the old lady about threa feet from the track, dead. Fireman John Bell corroborated in detail the evidence of his mate, but thought the woman's arms were folded, as if inviting death.
