The British Colonist, Toronto, complains
that an audience cannot be had of Sir Geo.
Arthur without Mr. Secretary Joseph being

between His Excellency and the visitor. It
also charges the Secretary with misrepresent-
ing the Governor's intentions as to granting
copies of despatches, and produces evidence
in point, and concludes by saying that "while
yet writing this article, a rumour has reached
us on which we place some reliance, that
changes may soon be looked for in His Ex-
cellency's councils, by which we trust the
country will be benefited."

THE CORONATION.
At a meeting of the inhabitants of the
Town of St. Andrews, held in the Court
House for the purpose of making arrange-
ments for celebrating the Coronation of the
Queen on the 28th instant, Colonel Wier
having been called to the Chair, addressed
the meeting and stated to them the object for
which they were assembled. He also re-
marked that the Town of St. Andrews had
long been distinguished for its devoted at-
tachment to the British constitution, and that
the numerous assembly which then attend-
ed around him, gave full assurance that the
same feelings of loyalty, which had always
characterized the people of this County,
were as ardent now as they had ever been.
After some further observations appropriate
to the occasion,
I was moved by G. D. Street, Esq. seconded
by R. M. Andrews, Esq. and carried unani-
mously.
That Thursday the 28th day of June in-
stant, being the day appointed for the Cor-
onation of Our Most Gracious Queen Victoria,
be kept as a public Holiday.
Moved by A. L. Street, Esq. seconded by
Wm. Ker, Esq. and carried unanimously.
That an Ox be immediately purchased
and properly dressed, and on Thursday the
28th instant roasted whole, and distributed
to the poor, in honor of the day, with such a
quantity of Ale as might be thought proper;
and that a Committee should be appointed
to carry into effect the objects of the meeting.
Moved by G. D. Street, Esq. and seconded
by R. M. Andrews, Esq.
That a general Illumination take place on
the evening of the 28th inst. between the
hours of 9 and 11 o'clock.
It was then moved and seconded that
Colin Campbell, Esq. Geo. D. Street, Esq.
Rev. Dr. Alley, Mr. F. A. Babcock,
Rev. Mr. M'Lean, R. M. Andrews, Esq.
Rev. Mr. Vaneher, and T. B. Wilson, Esq.
be the Committee, for the purpose already
mentioned.
Moved by Colin Campbell, Esq. seconded
by T. B. Wilson, Esq. that the proceedings
of the day be published in the St. Andrews
Standard.
It was then moved and seconded that Col.
Wier leave the chair, and A. L. Street, Esq.
take the same.
Upon which the thanks of the meeting
were unanimously voted to Col. Wier for his
conduct in the chair.

Whereas the Governor of Her Majesty's
Province of New Brunswick, with the Council
and Assembly of the said Province did in the
month of March, 1837, pass three Acts which
have been transmitted, initialed as follows,
viz.,
No. 1080. "An Act in addition to and in
amendment of the Laws now in force for re-
gulating Elections of Representatives to serve
in General Assembly in this Province."
No. 1081. "An Act for continuing the
General Assembly in this Province in case of
the demise of the Crown."
No. 1082. "An Act to erect part of the
County of Gloucester, into a separate and
distinct County."

And whereas the said Acts have been re-
ferred to the Committee of the Lords of Her
Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council ap-
pointed for the consideration of all matters
relating to Trade and Foreign Plantations,
and the said Committee have reported as their
opinion to Her Majesty was thereupon this
day passed by and with the advice of Her
Privy Council to declare Her special confir-
mation of the said Acts, and the same are
hereby specially confirmed, ratified, and finally
enacted accordingly. Whereof the Govern-

ANNO SEPTIMO GUILLIELMI IV. REGIS.
CAP. LV.
An Act in addition to and in amendment of
the Laws now in force for regulating Elec-
tions of Representatives to serve in Gener-
al Assembly in this Province.
Passed 1st March 1837.

WHEREAS it is desirable to lessen
the number of polling days in hold-
ing Elections in this Province, and also to
define the several places for polling in the
respective Counties;

I. Be it therefore enacted by the Lieuten-
ant Governor, Legislative Council and As-
sembly, That the tenth section of an Act
made and passed in the thirty first year of
the reign of His Majesty King George the
Third, intituled, "An Act for regulating
Elections of Representatives in General As-
sembly, and for limiting the duration of As-
semblies in this Province," be and the same
is hereby repealed; and in lieu thereof.

II. Be it further enacted, That every Poll
which at any Election hereafter holden in
any County of this Province shall be de-
manded, shall commence on the day the same
shall be demanded, and shall be duly and regu-
larly proceeded in from day to day (Sundays
and intervening days as hereinafter provided
excepted,) without delay or other adjourn-
ment in order that all voters present may have
an opportunity of being polled; and in case
any Candidate or two Electors, at such Elec-
tion, shall on the first day of holding the Poll,
so require, the Poll shall be removed and held
at the several places hereinafter appointed in
each County; and if the said Poll shall con-
tinue until the eighth polling day inclusive,
the same shall on that day be finally closed
at or before the hour of three o'clock in the
afternoon, and the Sheriff at every such elec-
tion shall immediately on the day next after
the final close of the Poll, truly and publicly
declare the name or names of the person or
persons who shall have the majority of votes
or such Poll, and shall forthwith make a re-
turn of such person or persons unless the
Sheriff upon a scrutiny being demanded by
any Candidate or any two or more Electors,
shall deem it necessary to grant the same, in
which case it shall and may be lawful for
him so to do, and to proceed thereupon but
so as that in all cases of an Election every
Sheriff having the return of a Writ of Elec-
tion shall close such scrutiny and make his
return upon such Writ on or before the day
on which such Writ is returnable.

III. And be it further enacted, That the
following places in the respective Counties
shall be and the same are hereby declared to
be the places at which the Poll in the re-
spective Counties shall be held (in case the
removal of the Poll be demanded as herein-
before provided) to wit:—

IN AND FOR THE COUNTY OF CHARLOTTE.
First day—At the Court House in Saint
Andrews.
Second day—At or near the Head of Oak
Bay in the Parish of St. David's.
Third day—In the Parish of Saint Ste-
phens.
Fourth day—(Allowing one week day to
intervene) At or near Digdegash mills in
the Parish of St. Patrick.
Fifth and sixth days—At or near the low-
er Falls in the Parish of St. George.
Seventh and eighth days—At the Court
House in St. Andrews.

CAP. LVI.
An Act for continuing the General Assembly
in this Province, in case of the demise of
the Crown.
Passed 1st March 1837.

WHEREAS some inconvenience might
arise, if the General Assembly of
this Province should be dissolved by the
death or demise of the King, (whom may
God long preserve,) or by the death or dem-
ise of any of His Majesty's Heirs and Suc-
cessors; for remedy thereof.

Be it enacted by the Lieutenant Governor,
Legislative Council and Assembly, That the
General Assembly, or any other General As-
sembly of this Province, which shall have
been summoned and called by our present
Sovereign Lord King William, or His Heirs
and Successors, shall not determine or be
dissolved by the death or demise of His said
Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, but such
General Assembly shall, and it is hereby en-
acted to continue and may meet, convene,
and sit, proceed and act, for the period of six
months, notwithstanding such death or demise
in the same manner, as if such death or dem-
ise had not happened; Provided always
and it is hereby enacted, that nothing in this
Act contained shall extend or be construed
to extend to alter or abridge the power of the
King, His Heirs and Successors, to prorogue
or dissolve the General Assembly of this Pro-
vince: Provided that nothing in this Act con-
tained, shall be of any force or effect, until
His Majesty's pleasure therein shall be had
and declared.

IN COUNCIL, JUNE 2, 1838.
ORDERED, That in future it be the duty
of the Commissioner of Crown Lands, to re-
strict the applicants for Timber Licenses to
such space of ground, as to him may appear
reasonable, to furnish the quantity of Timber
applied for; also, that in future the Commis-
sioner of Crown Lands be directed, in every
case, to furnish the names of all persons em-
ployed by his Deputies, and receiving com-
pensation for services.

From the Linrick Chronicle, May 5.
Two Sergeants, 12 rank and file of the
73d, returned this day from Cork, after leav-
ing a draft there from Clare Castle, to embark
for Canada.

The Barbarossa sailed yesterday from
Cork for Quebec, with the last division of the
71st Regt. and detachments of the corps serv-
ing in Canada.

The four Transports with the Horses of
the 1st Dragon Guards, sail from Cove to-
morrow for Quebec. The dismounted men
of that Corps and 7th Hussars, are waiting
for the Hercules, 71, from Plymouth.

Captains Brooke and Braithwaite, (just ap-
pointed), of the 32d, have received orders to
accompany the draft in the Hercules, 74, for
Canada.

Boudicca, transport, embarked two com-
panies of the Royal Artillery, under the
command of Colonel MacLachlan and Captain
Sheppard, at the Royal Arsenal, Woolwich,
on Friday, and sailed for Quebec on Satur-
day, calling at Deal on Monday.

Barossa, transport, Trivet, master, ar-
rived at Cork on Saturday from Plymouth,
to take troops to Quebec. The Barossa,
transport, will shortly sail from Cove with the
following drafts for Quebec:—For the 15th
Regiment, 3 officers, 92 rank and file; 34th
4 officers, 44 rank and file; 66th, 4 officers,
71 rank and file;—83d, 5 officers, 102 rank
and file; 85th, 2 officers, 61 rank and file.
Total—officers, 18; rank and file, 450.

1st DRAGON GUARDS.—The Regiment are
to embark on board the Marquis of Huntly,
the Calcutta, the Maria, and the Sienor, the
three last of which arrived at the Cove of
Cork on Monday.

It is now four years since we heard the
regular sound of the Bell at the Dock Yard to

her performance has in this instance surpas-
sed the first, and her voyage hence to Bar-
ce was accomplished in the space of four-
teen days, notwithstanding the weather was
for the greater part of the way boisterous
and unfavourable, in addition to which, an
accident that happened to the machinery, in
some degree impeded the progress she would
otherwise have made.

This experiment, as it was at first termed,
has become so fully and successfully tested
as to be no longer recognized to that name;
and as the object of the scheme regard-
ed at the outset, the successful prosecution
of five Voyages by the two steamers within a
short space of time, must have satisfied the
doubts of the most skeptical that the tem-
pestuous main may thus be ventured upon and
traversed with far greater economy of time,
and the same safety as in any conveyances
heretofore in use.

The joy and exultation occasioned on this
side the water by the appearance of these
vessels, seems to have met with a cordial re-
sponse on the other, and at an entertainment
given on board, the kindly sentiments ex-
pressed here towards our transatlantic brethren
were fully and warmly reciprocated. The
English journals too, we perceive, indulge at
length in just and well-earned reflections on
the benefits likely to arise from the prosecu-
tion of this new branch of navigation, in fa-
cilitating the transmission of general intelli-
gence, imparting to the two nations a proper
knowledge of each other, removing unfound-
ed and improper prejudices, and by affording
superior means of travel extending mutually
the intercourse, making, as it were, common
property the advantages derived by each from
their advances in science, mechanics, and
letters.

STEAM, that agent of universal potency,
whose triumphs are alike visible in the ma-
nufactory, on the rail road, and every naviga-
ble stream, has now snatched the trident
from the god of ocean, nor will its course be
stayed until its empire be universal.

Since writing the above, the Steamer
Sarus has arrived in safety from London, via
Cork, having left the latter place on the 21st
inst.

From the Toronto Palladium, June 6.
Anxious to give every particular we could
obtain relative to the arrival, and first move-
ments, of the new Governor General, the Earl
of Durham—we have been obliged to post-

the Proclamation now published, as his in-

plexed affairs of British America, during his
stay amongst us. Nothing can more strongly
prove their excellence, or more directly
tend to the strengthening of our hopes, than
the fact that the *Oligarchy* have already be-
gun to sneer at his Lordship, and denounce
him as a *Radical*!—Even so did the Com-
pact act towards poor Sir Francis, until they
had him in their net—and could dress him
as they pleased—they then all but worship-
ped him. But Lord Durham will be far above
their reach—and we have now a more lively
hope than ever, that the greatest calamity
under which the Province labours will be
speedily removed.—The Destruction of the
Oligarchy, as a Political Body!—Next will
follow the universal reprobation of this vast
and beautiful region; and all classes will go
on their way rejoicing.

Toronto, June 14.
LIEUT. GENERAL SIR JOHN COLBORNE.
It is impossible inadequately to describe the
joyous enthusiasm which pervaded all ranks, in
our city, during Monday and Tuesday last.—
Our former worthy Lieut. Governor, now Com-
mander of Her Majesty's Forces in British
North America, Sir John Colborne, arrived in
the Coburg steamer from below, and from the
period of his arrival to the moment of his em-
barcation, countless throngs of persons, from
the surrounding country hastened to pay their
respects to him. He seemed greatly gratified
with the ardent welcome with which he was
greeted, and he could not repress the emotion
which it produced. Recalled by the worthless
coterie who now preside at the helm of public
affairs at home, after the noble declaration and
pledge he had just given to the Constitutional-
ists of the province, that "The Constitution of
the Province should be firmly upheld," at that
moment when the Government was menaced
with destruction, by the motley crew, Macken-
zie, Gibson, Morrison, Durand, Wells, Rolph,
Bidwell, Moore, Alway, Duncombe, &c. &c.,
was Sir John Colborne recalled and hurried
away, with a large family, in the depth of win-
ter, from a people who revered him and who
had resolved to sustain him in his patriotic
course—the acclamations which greeted the
veteran chieftain in his progress around the
dormant secretary for the Colonies, and when
in New York preparing for his embarkation to

This will doubtless be a source of regret, to those who must reserve their smiles and blushes for another occasion.—There will however be no lack of amusements on the evening in question; and if, as has been said, half the pleasure of life consists in anticipation, no serious effects will result from hope being thus unexpectedly deferred.

The LEXER and BALI, which were to have taken place on the 28th inst. are postponed in consequence of the unavoidable absence of His Excellency the Lieut. Governor, during the ensuing week.

Government House, June 22, 1838.
Capt. ONYON arrived in town yesterday morning at an early hour from Quebec, and proceeded on to Halifax in the course of the forenoon. We understand that tranquility prevailed in the Canada, and that Sir J. J. Colborne had returned from his tour to the Upper Province. His Excellency Sir JOHN HARVEY and Suite, are understood to have left Fredericton early this morning for Quebec.—Sentinel.

We understand that Washington papers mention the arrival of Lord Aberdeen, &c. &c. New Dalrymple and Col. Grey in that city on their way to Canada.

St. John, June 25.
We understand that His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor was to leave Head Quarters at 4 o'clock this morning, en route for Quebec. Colonel Goggin, of the 11th Regt. the senior Military Officer in the Province, left town this morning in the Steamer Fredericton, for Head Quarters, to conduct the Govern-
ment during his Excellency's absence.—Courier.

BURNING OF A STEAM BOAT, AND MELAN-
CHOLY LOSS OF LIFE.
The steamboat North America is just in, by the passengers of which we learn the particu-
lars of a most heart-rending calamity—the destruction of the new and elegant steam boat Washington, by fire, off Silver Creek, about three o'clock this morning, with the estimated loss of FIFTY LIVES.

The Washington passed the North Amer-
ica while the latter lay at Erie, in the early part of the night, and was not again seen by those on board the North America until within about three miles of this city, a bright glare of light was discovered by the helms-
man, in the direction of Silver Creek, and the North America was instantly put about for the scene of apprehended danger.

On nearing the spot, about 6 o'clock, the burning Hull of the large and noble boat was found drifting over the waters, three or four miles from shore, with not a living human being on board. The lake was literally cov-
ered with hats, bonnets, trunks, baggage, and blackened fragments of the wreck.

The intense anxiety of the witnesses of this fearful scene, for the fate of the passengers on the unfortunate Washington, was partially relieved by the discovery of several small boats near the shore, in which the survivors of the disaster had been rescued from de-
struction.

The North America took on board about forty of those saved, many of whom, includ-
ing all the ladies, remained on shore. There were six dead bodies picked up on the spot—those of four children and two women. One man died of injuries soon after reaching the shore, and one child was dead in its mother's arms when she was taken out of the water.

A humorous fellow, a carpenter, being sum-

penter answered, "just four feet six inches and a half." "Pray thee, fellow," says the counsel, "how is it possible you can be so very exact as to distance?" "I thought," says the carpenter, "that some fact or other might ask me, so I measured it."
