There are now dozens of models, of all sorts and sizes. on the market, each claimed to be the best. The magazine hand cameras are the most popular for tourists. They vary in size from the small watch-case instrument, weighing but a few ounces, to those a foot or more across

To gain a full knowledge, the amateur should begin with the bellows camera and tripod; the smallest tripod cameras use a 24,x37,4 inch plate, and the hand cameras range from $1\frac{1}{2}x1\frac{1}{2}$ to 8x10. The 4x5 inch plates are large enough for most purposes and are of the most convenient size and artistic shape.

The best models carry from six to twelve sensitive plates, these drop always before the lens.
