

CASE FOR DISPLAYING SHEETS OF PAPER.

An excellent device for fully displaying a large stock of tissue paper has been invented and patented in Canada and the United States by Mr. Maurice M. Vardon, of Toronto, Ont., Canada. For various decorative purposes an immense amount of tissue paper is used, so that its convenient storage and handling is quite an object to attain. The device in question can be used either in the form of a cabinet of drawers or arranged in a stand rack. When used in drawers, the drawer is constructed of a frame with the bottom hinged to the rear portion in such manner that when the drawer is drawn out the bottom drops down and hangs nearly The drawer frame is provided pendant. with a number of parallel transverse rods, and the frame being drawn out, the bottom hanging pendant by its hinges, the paper sheets are placed over the rods, each rod having a supply of a different color, so that the frame is stocked with variegated colors. the sheets hanging by their folds, and a large quantity of tissue paper can thus be stored. In this position it will keep smooth and be convenient of access. When the drawer frame is pushed back the ledge causes the bottom to rise up, bringing the pendant paper to be upon it, so that the different sections lie inclined one upon the other

within the closed drawer. When the drawer is again drawn out, the bottom swings down, allowing the paper to again hang pendant for display. A series of these drawers can thus be stocked in a case and a great quantity of paper stored.

In another mode of applying this invention, the frame with its parallel rods is pivot ally attached to an inclined back that may rest upon the floor, being field by a folding brace. The display frame is held upward, somewhat inclined downward at its outer end, and is supported by a cross bar attached to pivoted side arms, so that the whole can be folded flat together. The arrangement is also ad pied to be hung to the wall. The frames pivotally attached to the bottom of the casing fold upward, the pendant sheets on the respective rods banging in easy view and lapping one on the other, making a pleasing display.
