The City Markets. There are no changes of consequence to note this week. Produce is coming in freely, but the demand is equal to the supply. Feed barley 20c to 22c; malting barley 25c to 30c. No. 1 hard, 65c. No. 2 hard and 1 Northern, 62c. No. 3 hard and 2 Northern, 45c. No. 1 frosted, 35c. No. 2 frosted, 35c. Oats, 33c. Feed, 30c. Butter—Scarce dairy, fresh prints, 20c to 25c a lb; tub, 18c; cooking, 12 1/2c to 14c. Eggs—Fresh, 25c. packed 15c. Poultry—Chicken, live, per pair, 90c. Turkeys—12c to 13c a lb. Geese—Scarce; 10c a lb. Wood—\$5.00 to \$5.50 a ton. Wool—Tamarac, \$5 per cord; poplar, \$3.50 to \$4; cedar posts, 8c a post (7 ft. length).

Vegetables—Potatoes 40c per bush; turnips, 25c to 30c a bush; onions \$1.50 a bush; parsnips, 40c a bush. Meats, etc.—Butchers killed beef, 5 1/2c to 6c per lb. by the carcass; pork, 7c to 7 1/2c; lamb \$4 to \$5 a piece. No. 1 steers, 3c; No. 1 cows, 2 1/2c. Tallow—Rendered, 4 1/2c to 5c; unrendered, 2c to 3c. Lard—\$2.35 to \$2.60 per cask. Fish—Whitefish, 5 1/2c per lb; pike and pickerel, 2 1/2c. Hides—No. 1, 3 1/2c; No. 2, 2 1/2c; No. 3, 2c; sheepskins fresh killed, from 60c to \$1. Wool—Coarse, 8c; mixed, 9c to 10c; pure down, 11c. Straw—\$3 per ton.

If a person orders his paper discontinued, he must pay up all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made and then collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not. 3. In suits for subscriptions, the suit may be instituted in the place where the paper is published, although the subscriber may reside hundreds of miles away. 4. The courts have decided that refusing newspapers or periodicals from the post office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for while unpaid, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
