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"The Governance of Empire."

IMPERIAL unity—the unity of the British Empire—must be built on a sure foundation. Closer union must be the consummation and result of experience and evolution, the product of an educational process, backed up by Imperial sentiment and conviction.

There must exist an inward and spiritual unity, which must precede outward and constitutional organization. The nation-States must be made to feel in a real way their Imperial interest and oneness, and their part in the shaping of Imperial destinies. They must realise that the continuance of the Empire is bound up with the Empire's problems, and that these problems are for them—all of them—to solve, and that they must come together and solve them. The continuance of the Empire, therefore, depends upon the establishment of a means whereby there shall be heard at the centre the voice of the Imperial provinces for common purposes and joint functions.
