This system must be guarded and protected, for its destruction could, like a row of falling dominoes, make Canada a place where nothing and no one would be able to exist. Dr. Munro, a senior official in the Canadian Department of the Environment, is well able to explain the importance of this ecological balance.

Moodie, Susanna. ROUGHING IT IN THE BUSH. McCelland and Stewart, 1962. \$1.95, paper.

Forest life in Canada for a genteel English woman in the 1830's was rough. One such woman, Susanna Moodie, has immortalized the plight of the English settlers in her autobiographical reminiscence of the years with her husband and family in the lonely backwoods of Eastern Ontario. This she does with lively forthright humour, and her picture of the hardships and of the eccentricities of her neighbours is a classic.
