The above recommendation, if accepted, raises some further considerations. First, how should the two publications be combined? A direct combination, with both diplomatic and consular listings together, would be the most efficient.

However, such a combination would not be entirely satisfactory as there are in effect two groups of users as outlined previously. It is therefore proposed that the new publication be divided into two sections; the first containing "diplomatic" information and the second listing "consular" information.

In this regard, it is further proposed that there be no duplication of listings in the two sections.

The second consideration is that of the shape of the publication and as there is no internationally accepted convention there are no restrictions other than that it be in good taste and convenient. The generally accepted means of making such a listing bilingual is to arrange the information as follows:

First Secretary......Georges M. Schmid......Premier Secrétaire 2043 Cabot Ave.

Even though the "copy" can be reduced photographically, such reduction is limited to 35% which means that the width of the page should be at least 7 3/4" in order that the print be easily readable. The nearest standard size paper (as recommended by T.B. 667239) is 5 1/4" by 7 3/4". This means that the book would be wider than it is high and that it
