Hon. Milton F. Gregg (Minister of Labour): Mr. Speaker, on behalf of my colleague the Minister of Veterans Affairs (Mr. Lapointe), who is away on duty, I should like to say a word on this resolution. It is a pleasure at this time to renew acquaintance with my old friend the resolution of the hon. member for Battle River (Mr. Fair). Each year, when I had the honour of being minister of veterans affairs, I had that pleasure.

I express my thanks to the hon. member tonight for bracketing my name with that of the present minister and of the parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Veterans Affairs, in connection with the useful efforts that have been made on this subject. I am not going to make a prolonged speech. Certainly I am not going to make the old speech made in the past, because I have not had a chance to dig it up.

I am interested, however, in seeing that this problem, brought before the house each year by the hon. member for Battle River is, like the old soldier, not dead, but gradually fading away. Indeed it is fading away very rapidly, if we may judge by the figures quoted tonight. I believe it was in 1948 when we did institute a program, and at that time we said it would be a long-term one. However, it is not going to be so long because, as the parliamentary assistant said this evening, before very long, the whole matter will be wiped out in orderly fashion. And perhaps it will be cleared up with priority given to those-and I say this after due thought-who deserved it most in the first instance.

Having said that, it is with a good deal of regret that I must tell my hon. friend again this year that the government is not prepared to concur in his resolution. Consequently I shall find it my duty to vote against it. However, I join with him in expressing appreciation to the minister and his parliamentary assistant, as well as to the director of the Veterans Land Act, for the sympathetic understanding they are giving to veteran problems, and particularly the problems of the old-timers affected by this resolution.
