MEASURES TO RESOLVE LABOUR-MANAGEMENT DISPUTE— MOTION UNDER S.O 43

Mr. Gordon Towers (Red Deer): Mr. Speaker, I rise on a matter of urgency under the provisions of Standing Order 43. The Postmaster General (Mr. Lamontagne) answered a question put by the hon. member for Brandon-Souris (Mr. Dinsdale) on October 31, 1978, as reported at page 637 of *Hansard*, as follows:

Reports I receive indicate that workers are back to work: they are working better than they have ever worked.

In view of the fact that is not so, because the mail sorting rate in some areas is less than 50 per cent compared to one month ago, and tension is mounting which has an adverse effect on employee morale, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Brandon-Souris:

That the Postmaster General meet immediately with the Association of Postal Officials of Canada to attempt to resolve this unacceptable situation, because establishment of a Crown corporation will not remove the frustrations forced on dedicated postal workers, including management.
