## NO PRIZE PACKETS BEING GIVEN AWAY

Controller McCarthy's Reply to Request for Fixed Assessment.

## BATHURST RATEPAYERS

Crowded Meeting in Hillcrest School Discussed Annexation.

Controller McCarthy addressed a crowd of meeting of the Bathurst Hill ratepayers in Hillcrest Public School last night, deputations being present from Fairbank, N. E. Faircourt, Oakwood and North Bathurst districts in the township.

As Bathurst Hill does not know any boundary line, said Controller McCarthy, "and is not a definite district, I will rather give you some information and there my duty ends."

He hoped to see the city grow up to be the greatest city on the American continent, and hoped that the citizens would have sufficient foresight to build for ten years ahead and if those at present outside the boundaries were not prepared to look ahead for five years they had better stay outside, but there was at present no district adjacent to any city on the continent ruled by a rural municipality where conditions were satisfactory.

Housing Problem. The greatest problem in Toronto today said the controller was to develop conditions by which workmen could secure homes at a reasonable cost with all sanitary conveniences. The city was at present making a constructive effort to provide homes of this class, he said, and was offering two prizes of \$800 and \$1000 for the best plan of a semi-detached and detached house which would comply with building by-laws and afford the most accommodation at the least cost. He regretted, however, that the city building regulations were too strict to allow a man to erect a suitable home within his means.

The controller emphasized the necessity for extending the city's borders so as to enable the population to go out into the open country and live under conditions which would develop the highest type of manhood, pointing out that if it were not for the influx of people from the country the general average of physique would not be as good as it was. He was willing to pay dollars often as it was asked of him for the city to spread out in order that the conditions of life for the average man might be improved.

Civic Car Lines. With regard to the civic car line half a million was paid for it, and it increased the value of adjoining land in the township and residents outside paid nothing for it. It would be the same with the Bloor street viaduct.

If the boundaries remain as they are for twenty years, said the controller, "it will be a sad day for Toronto. New territory is as vital a necessity to the city as our meals tomorrow, whether we want it or the territories will be ever coming in and we hope for their betterment."

There was little use, he thought, of rigorous sanitary inspection in Toronto if a section on the other side was not as well looked after.

With regard to transportation the controller thought that the "Dovercourt" Bathurst and Lansdowne avenues line ought to be extended to connect with the civic lines, and that the city should put down the roadbed and rails.

In response to a question by Chas. E. Lacey whether he would favor taking the district in on a fixed assessment the controller said that he was not giving away any prize packets.

## BALMY BEACH

St. John's, Nfld., Wants to Suspend City Council for Y. C. Council (Special Correspondence).

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., March 13.—The executive committee of the citizens' committee have decided to lay a radical suggestion before a meeting of citizens in regard to the management of the municipality. The committee argues that the present form of government be suspended by the legislature when the term of the present mayor and councilmen expires in the summer, and that the suspension last for one year.

It is also suggested by the committee that the municipal elections be suspended for twelve months, and that ten or twelve citizens be appointed by the governor-in-council to take over the management of the city for one year, and that these form an interim municipal government. Outside the temporary management of civic affairs, the special object of the commission will be to investigate and reorganize municipal work and to prepare for submission to the legislature in the session of 1915 a new charter for the city. The promoters of the movement believe that it is essential to a successful reorganization of civic affairs to be in daily touch with the actual work of the city government. It is also proposed that the members shall serve disinterestedly, and shall receive absolutely no pay or emolument of any kind.

For Public Ownership.

Mr. Foster supported government ownership and co-operative systems, which have been so long and so earnestly advocated in the house by W. F. Macdonald (South York), by declaring that he believed that in them lay not only the salvation of the west, but also the salvation of Canada generally.

"Their effect," declared Mr. Foster in conclusion, "is to reduce the high cost of living, and I believe the extension of the co-operative system to Eastern Canada would tend to lower the present high cost of living." (Applause.)
