Government Inquiry Into University Affair

The whole matter of German professors in Toronto University now rests in the hands of the government, and a thoro investigation directed from all angles inkely to lear up the shuation, will be instituted at once by the Ontario cabinet. In the spirit of the words of Premier rearst, spoken last night to a monster deputation at Queen's Fark, no stone will be left unturned and no step will be left unturned and no responsioility would be sidestepped, and since the affair was of so much moment hasty action could not be expected. The subject very properly demanded investigation and care, and it would receive it.

The position of the government was taken, following two spirited appeals by Dr. Chas. Sheard and E. W. J. Owens, M.J.A., who claimed to be speaking on behalf of the city and the province, and whose assertions were backed up in vigorous fashion by the large body of men in the chamber.

Made His Blood Boil.

"It makes the blood of these gentlemen boil as it does my own to think that the coffers of our government are being depleted to fill the pockets of these German professors so that they can go dangling up and down the streets with nothing to do," declared Mr. Owens amid enthusias-ic support. "Here we are sending our blood and brawn and money to fight the battles of the empire, and yet the moneys of this province are diverted to support these three men. It is a sad day and a reflection on the government and the province that a time has come when a German professor drawing government money can hire a Swedish professor out of his own pocket to

Mueller incident at Harbord and the exoneration by the board of education, to assist in voicing his protest against the action of the governors "in subsidizing to the extent of permitting the German professors to go to the end of the season drawing pay without performing their duties." The petitien signed by professors in favor of Mueller was not fair, and the board of education had properly censured it.

"This thing has compromised the university seriously in the eyes of the public," he claimed. "We state that the method of advancing salary to these men while not working, is contrary to the spirit of the people and all British precedent. The action of the governors is in direct conflict with the na lonal ideals with which the university was founded.

"We are not here to ask radical action on the part of the government," he continued, "but solely in the interest of the institution to ask a thoro investigation, and if it is found that the spirit of the act has been over-ridden we are prepared to go further and urge total reorganization."
