exceffes of a populous and enlightened nation became fuch as would be hardly credible, if faid to be committed by armed favages in a ftate of intoxication and madnefs.

I turn from the recollection of those exceffes to dwell for a few moments on the impression which they have left. The triumphs of a criminal people had not fo far dazzled the world, as to subdue that abhorrence of crimes, which a benevolent Creator hath implanted in the human mind. The eyes of men were now opened; and the notion of liberty, raifed in the cradle of terror, amidst crowded camps and overflowing gaols, was considered as a phantom, a deception, a monstrous dream in a delirium.
