## OBSERVATIONS, &c.

In will be recollected, my fellow citizens, that while I have claimed, as one of the representatives of the American people, the right of acting according to my own judgment, on all questions which concern their general interests, I have always deemed it my duty to you, from whom I received the appointment, to make you acquainted not only with my opinion and conduct on every important measure, but also with the reasons by which I have been guided.

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This duty I am now about to fulfit in a case of the highest importance. Having on two former occasions declared to you in the most unreserved manner, my opinion respecting the differences which have unfortunately arisen between this country and France, I am now about to explain the reasons whereon that opinion is founded.

After stating some considerations which have induced me to believe that the charges alledged against us by France, are wholly unfounded, I shall endeavour to place her conduct and views respecting this country in their true light, and to
