

CITY HALL NOTES

Sir Adam Beck is leaving for England on Friday and will not return to Toronto before the end of next January. For three weeks past the Hydro chairman has been actively engaged in trying to clear up all the York radial's troubles, and it is said he has made considerable progress towards a final settlement.

After meditation in the silence of the Sabbath, Controller McBride will, on Monday next, make the long awaited announcement as to whether he will or will not run for the mayor's chair next year. Unless a third candidate should appear between this and Monday, it is safe to say that the controller's announcement will be a very guarded one, so as to leave himself a loop-hole whereby he could be nominated for the chair at the last moment.

Alderman Ramsden, it is said, is awaiting the council's decision before deciding whether he will run for the mayorality or a controllership. If the controller has a shot at the chair so will the alderman, but not otherwise. Then again, Alderman Mcgrigge is anxious to know exactly what Alderman Ramsden intends doing, as in the event of the latter going for the mayorality, Alderman Mcgrigge will run for the board of control.

Alderman Hiltz, who was generally supposed to be seeking a controllership, has evidently decided to remain in the ranks of the aldermen. Speaking at the works committee the alderman said: "I shall come back to the council as an alderman if I am back at all." Such words are a pretty definite hint as to the alderman's views.

Should Alderman Ramsden run for mayor he would obtain a large soldier vote despite the fact that the returned men may run a candidate of their own. On the other hand at a well-attended meeting of the U.V.L. on Tuesday night, it was decided unanimously to work and vote for the greatest mayor. The soldiers are fairly certain in their own minds of returning their candidate for controller. Instructions are being given all the members to use only one vote on the controllers' list. They hope by thus depriving other candidates of any votes to put their nominee near the head of the poll.

It was pointed out yesterday that there would be ample time for half a dozen smallpox outbreaks to occur in Toronto before Dr. McCouga could put his mandamus into effect compelling the council to issue the compulsory vaccination proclamation. The council could appeal the mandamus and thus the legal game could be kept going right up to the privy council—lawyers would make the case last for eight or nine months easily.

The board of works, at a special meeting yesterday afternoon, subject to a report by Commissioners Harrie and Norman, decided to extend Norway ave. north to Lee ave. The extension, exclusive of grading, will cost some \$40,000. The city will pay 46 per cent of the improvement and assess 54 per cent against the improvement of the property.

The same two commissioners will also prepare a report on the grading of Woodbine avenue. In 1916 the work could have been done for \$115,000, but it is expected quite \$200,000 will be necessary today. It was pointed out by the commissioner that Woodbine was the only street connecting Queen street and Kingston road between Coxwell avenue and some considerable distance east.

Davenport road is to be paved and generally made up at a cost of about \$28,900. This will make Alderman Blackburn's heart glad indeed as he has worked hard for many months to get the improvement passed by the board of works.

Early closing amongst tradesmen in Toronto seems to be increasing in popularity. The retail butchers are the latest to send on a petition to the council asking for a bylaw to close them up at 7 o'clock in the evening.

The Oakdale Company are offering to buy the city garbage for \$15,000 per year. At the present time it costs the city \$172,000 to dispose of it. The matter will be considered after a report from the works commissioner.

City officials of both sexes employed inside the city hall held in organization meeting last night to found a society for the protection of the city's streets, salaries and employment were concerned. "Jimmy" Somers was in the chair.

The telegraph operators attached to the first alarm division of the fire department are claiming they are underpaid and have written to the board of control on the subject.

The board of control will today consider a report from Fire Chief Russell recommending replacing entirely the present fire trucks with six triple combination hose, chemical and pumpers, two of which are already on order. The chief claims that by the new method there would be a saving of 45 men, representing a yearly salary of \$60,000. He would also be able to close up station No. 15, Cowan avenue.

The board of control will today consider the appointment of a new city architect. It is probable that the city clerk will be required to advertise the vacancy. Only two formal applications have so far been received, one from F. H. Sykes, and the other from T. D. Mylrea, who is said to be at present drawing \$5,000 per annum.

The two corporation counsels, G. R. Geary and I. S. Fairly, are sailing from England, where they have been before the privy council, on Saturday and will be back in the city hall soon after landing in New York.

The city architect's department had a bad day's business yesterday—probably owing to the coming of winter. The following permits were, however, issued: To the Wm. Davies Company, for a retail store at 29-31 West Queen street. This is to replace the headquarters retail building on the north side, between Yonge and James streets, which is to be vacated. The new building is now being erected. It will cost \$60,000.
