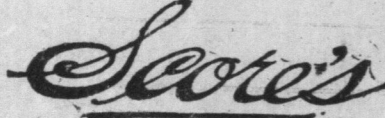

**HAMILTON HAS ARRANGED FOR RECEPTION OF HERO**

Takes Place Tuesday Evening, Rain or Fine—Governor-General's Visit.

Hamilton, May 18.—(Special)—It was arranged this evening that the reception to the Marathon race hero would take place next Tuesday evening regardless of the weather. Both steamboat companies wanted the honor of carrying him, and the reception committee from Toronto, but the Hamilton Steamboat Company, which made its offer first, was chosen. Its steamers will arrive here about 8 o'clock. If the weather is fine the reception will take place at Victoria Park, and if it rains in the drill hall. A civic address will be presented to Sherring by Mayor Bigger, and after a short program he will be turned over to St. Patrick's Club, who will entertain him after he has seen his parents. The hero will ride at the head of the procession in an automobile. Many of the aldermen, who will go to Toronto Tuesday to take part in the demonstration there.

Saltfleet Township Council has made an application to the railway commission to have the line of the Toronto & Hamilton Railway located on the filtering basin lands. The fire and water committee met this evening and passed a resolution against it.

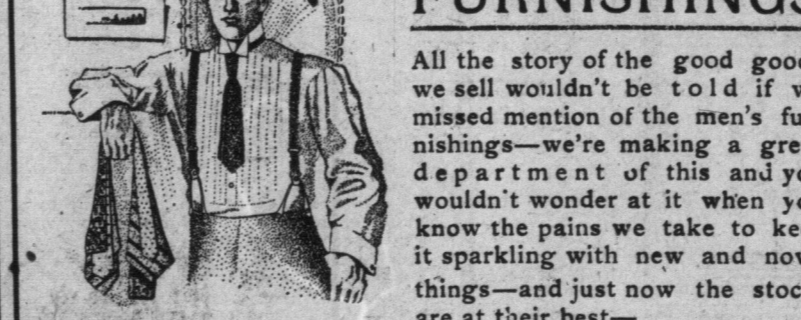

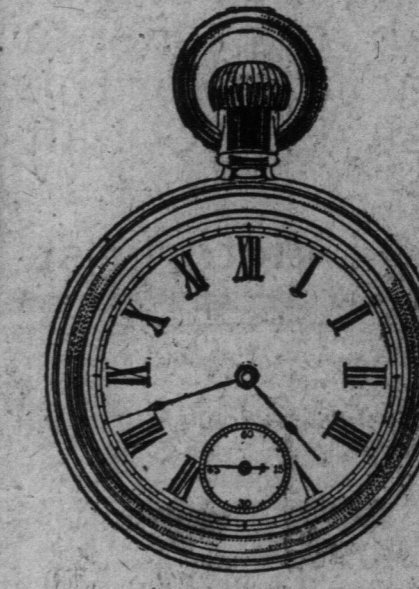
