Chicago, Oct. 18.—D. M. Linnard, a mine owner of Rossland, B. C., was at the Auditorium yesterday, on his way east.

"I am going east," said Mr. Linnard, "for the purpose of purchasing machinery with which to develop our mines. The richness of the silver mines in the Kootenay district, of which Rossland is a part, is simply amazing. Why, silver is being mined there at a cost of less than 20c an ounce, and the silver mine owners there would get rich under a free coinage law, even if the ratio was 64 to 1 instead of 16 to 1.

"The district is a new one, situated near the boundary between this country and British America, and was opened up by American prospectors. Rossland, which had only 500 inhabitants eighteen months ago, has now a population of nearly 6000. The mines in which I am interested produce gold, but the silver mines are the richest ones in the district."
