THE POSTAGE ON DROP LETTERS.
Now that the City Council and the Board of Trade have passed resolutions favoring the reduction of postage on drop letters to one cent they should adopt an aggressive policy for bringing about the proposed reform. The Postmaster-General seems disposed to make changes in the system wherever such changes can be shown to be in the interests of the people. We think it would not be difficult to make out a case in favor of a one-cent postage for drop letters. It can be shown that the cost of delivery, in Toronto at least, is less than one cent per letter. A reduction in the postage would cause a great increase in the local business in all the cities, especially in Toronto and Montreal. Many firms who deliver their own letters would use the postoffice if a one-cent rate were adopted. The postoffice should be able to deliver letters cheaper than anyone else, and the residents of the cities should not be subjected to a higher rate for delivering drop letters than what is necessary to cover the expense for the service.

BEST SUGAR.
The Owen Sound Sugar Manufacturing Company imported from Germany, last spring, a large quantity of sugar beet seed, which was extensively distributed among farmers on the lake shore, and on the lines of the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways, in order to test the adaptability of that section of the country for the production of sugar beets of good quality. When the crop was matured, Mr. McFarlane, Dominion Analyst, was sent from Ottawa to select from the lots of roots which were being gathered by a committee appointed for the purpose. He found a number of average samples, which were forwarded to the laboratories at Ottawa and Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph for analysis.

Mr. Harcourt, professor of chemistry at Guelph College, has completed the analysis of the 40 samples sent to him, and has reported thereon. He finds: Average weight of roots 152 pounds; solids 18.800 per cent; sugar 14.78 per cent; purity 70.06. Out of the 40 samples there were only four lots which might be called inferior. If these were left out, the percentages would be: Solids, 18.736; sugar, 15.20; purity 81.16. The Owen Sound Company may be congratulated on the well-deserved success which has attended their extensive experiment in sugar beet cultivation. The percentage of sugar found in their beets is considerably above the average contained in any of the sugar beet countries of Europe. The purity of the juice is very fair, but still leaves something to be desired, which can easily be accomplished by more attention to the preparation of the soil. The experiment has been a decided success, and when viewed in connection with several former years' experiments in other sections of Ontario, shows conclusively that the soil and climate of this province are admirably adapted to the production of sugar beets. Canada would be able, within a very few years, to produce all the sugar required for its own consumption.
