THEY WANT RUSSELL SQUARE

Neighboring Property-Owners Will Ask
the Trades Council for Aid.

Police Will Try to Better Regulate Street
Traffic—Better Pavement Wanted for
Queen-street West—Cars for Early Sun-
day Traffic—\$10,000,000 to be Spent on
Queen-street.

The continued illness of Mayor Shaw
and Controller Hubbard has kept business
pretty much at a standstill at the City
Hall. His Worship failed to take advan-
tage of the fact that Controller Leslie's
term of military service ends to-day and
a meeting of the Board of Control at his
house. He was advised, however, that the
meeting will probably be called to-mor-
row.

Right to Open Russell Square.
The adverse opinion given by His Honor
the Lieutenant-Governor has by no means
blasted the hopes of the West End pro-
prietors who are promoting the ad-
vancement of the Russell Square project.
Manager Beaman of the Arlington estate
as a matter of course and in company with
a number of others will try to enlist the
sympathies of the Trades and Labor Coun-
cil with the movement. Judging by the
record of the labor organizations, no oppo-
sition will be anticipated by the council.
Addressed to the Trades Council at its next
meeting this day week.

Read Signs, Beware Police!
In response to complaints forwarded to
him by the Mayor upon the subject of in-
fringements of the rules of the road, Chief
Gustafson issued a letter to the Mayor yes-
terday that the Police Commissioners have
no power to regulate street traffic except
under by-laws passed by council. "How-
ever," he says, "when the police go on
summer duty, which will be in about a
week or two, I have it in contemplation
to station constables along the more
traveled thoroughfares, such as King
and Yonge-streets, at the important street
intersections, where they can take note of
any violations of the rule of the road, and
do their best to keep the traffic in its
proper channels."

A Big Improvement Contemplated.
There is every prospect that the end of
the coming summer will see an improved
pavement on Queen-street, from Yonge to
the subway. Sections of a monster petition
for asphalt are being assiduously circu-
lated by Messrs. G. B. Cook, J. S. S.
Botsford, P. T. Lee, W. J. Mackenzie, ex-
Ald. Croker and others, and no trouble is
anticipated in getting the necessary two-
thirds of the ratepayers along the street
to subscribe.

Tram Lines.
The assessors will begin fixing the valua-
tion of property for 1898 about April 15
next. The department would be glad to
hear from owners of houses, no cars to
names are not on the assessment rolls as
soon as possible.

Be Careful at Early Sunday Trains.
The traveling public have been complain-
ing to the City Engineer that the Street
Railway Company are sending no cars to
the Union Station to meet the three trains
arriving at 7 and 7.15 a.m. on Sunday.
Manager Keating has been requested to
break the 9 a.m. Sunday service regulation
to meet this requirement.

Threaten to Sue Montreal.
The Allen Manufacturing Company of 103
Simcoe-street have been negotiating for
some time past with the Assessment Com-
missioner to acquire certain privileges, in-
cluding in which they may move to Montreal,
where they have been operating for some
time. They have been offered fascinating in-
ducements. They represent that the large in-
crease in their underwear trade has neces-
sitated the expansion of their factory pre-
mises. They now own a building in the city
and expect to almost double that number
providing the city will grant the neces-
sary privileges. They are asking for water at
the rate of \$1.00 per 1000 gallons.

THE LATE THOMAS R. SKIPPON.

Many Prominent Citizens at the Obsequies
Yesterday—Various Societies Well
Represented—Tributes of Respect.

The funeral of the late Thomas R.
Skippon, storekeeper of the Waterworks
Department, took place yesterday after-
noon from the residence, 6 Phoebe-street,
to Mount Pleasant Cemetery. Rev.
Canon Sweeney read the service at the
house, and afterwards at a public service
at St. Philip's Church.

Many beautiful wreaths from friends
and societies bore evidence of the esteem
in which the deceased was held.
The pallbearers, eight in number,
were: From the Veterans of '66, Capt.
Munson and Mr. Fred. Knott; from the
S.O.B.E.S., H. Emmett and George
Croucher; from A.O.U.W., J. Bromley
and William Barton; from Brunswick
L.O.L., 404, H. A. E. Kent and Walter
H. Blight. Each of these societies also
sent a delegation of members to the
funeral procession.

After the services at St. Philip's Church
the funeral procession, which reached
from St. Patrick-street almost to College,
set out for the cemetery, where the re-
mains were interred.

A great many prominent civic officials
attended the funeral.
Deceased only became a member of
the S.O.E., joining Middlesex Lodge,
which time and again sent him to the
supreme Grand Lodge. Finally he was
elected Supreme Grand Master of the
society. He was also for thirty years a
working member of Brunswick L.O.L.,
404, in which he held the position of
secretary for fifteen years. He was
corporal in No. 5 Company, Royals, Capt.
Munson's company, and was present at
Ridgeway. He was also a member of
the old fire brigade.

BRAKEMAN DECAPITATED.

John Daville Was Hit Fall by a Defective
Plank on Which He Was
standing.

Huntsville, Ont., March 29.—About
2:30 p.m. to-day a brakeman on the
Grand Trunk Railway named John
Daville fell between two cars of his
train and was killed, his head being
cut clean off. A defective plank on a
load of lumber broke and let him down.
His home is in Barrie, where he has a
wife and one child. Coroner Rees de-
cided that no inquest was necessary.

BRANFORD NOTES.

Rate of Taxation Put up—Blood Poisoning
Killed John Galbraith.

Brantford, March 29.—A special meet-
ing of the Estimates Committee of the
City Council last night decided to raise
the assessment for the coming year from
17 to 17-1/2 mills. This rate does not
include the frontage tax, sewer tax or
water rate.

John Galbraith, aged 55, died at the
hospital this morning from blood poison-
ing. Deceased had been employed for
the past ten years as boiler maker at
Waterson Engine Works. A few weeks
ago he got his foot badly bruised with
a heavy piece of iron, from the effects
of which blood poisoning set in. De-
ceased was very highly respected, a mem-
ber of Zion Church, and was a very
active worker in the Balfour-street
Mission Church. The funeral will be
under the direction of the Sons of Scot-
land, of which deceased was a mem-
ber.

THE TRACT SOCIETY.

Record of a Year's Work in the Dissemina-
tion of the Word of Life and
Good Literature.

The Directors of the Upper Canada
Religious Tract and Book Society have
presented their annual report, in
which much good work is recorded. Dur-
ing the past year the society has distrib-
uted 30,000 volumes of the very best
religious work, while 5000 copies of
the Bible have been disposed of. Tracts
have been spread over the country to the
number of 257,200, and 25,000 Sun-
day School papers sent out gratuitously.
To give an idea of the amount of work
done there is the report of Mr. Bone,
whose department is labouring among the
sailors of the Welland Canal. During
the season of navigation he made 723
visits to vessels, and placed 42 well-illed
sailors' bags on board. He gave away
New Testaments and Prayer Books,
and distributed 17,387 tracts, periodicals
and booklets. Rev. R. C. Moffat, Sec-

Belleville Man Killed at Niagara.


Belleville, March 29.—News received
